At its meeting of March 1 the Farmington City Council authorized City Manager John Dorian to submit a plan to the Oakland County Board of Health for a relief sewer on South Valley Drive. It also agreed to accept the bid of the Pioneer Excavating Co. for sewer and water extensions on Industrial Drive. The bid was for \$16,428.25.

Praises Dems Broad Base

Dr. Edward C. McIrvine, a Ford Motor Company research scientist who is chairman of the Farmington Democratic Club, issued the following statement on Tuesday, March 2.

"As precinct organization chairman, I am one of the few appointed officials in Democratic politics. It therefore seems suitable that I should comment in response to Thomas Nolan, the appointed Republican chairman. Mr. Nolan has seen fit to comment freely and at length upon the Democratic organization in Farmington, about which he appears to have absolutely no knowledge.

"Unlike the Republican party, the Democratic party operates through election rather than appointment. The local Farmington Democratic Club, with membership open to all, holds a one-man-one-vote election for club officials.

"Aldo Vagozzi, noted for his many community activities, is currently serving his second one-year term as elected club chairman. The club meetings on the first Wednesday of each month serve as a forum for the discussion of issues, and as a platform for a variety of speakers. There is no comparable Republican organization; therefore there is no spokesman for the Republicans who can be called Mr. Vagozzi's counterpart.

"Unlike the Republican party, the Democratic party puts its precinct organization under local control. The club members are elected by the precinct organization chairman. Unlike the Republican case with an autocratic system of appointment, the Democratic precinct organization is elected in a primary election of last September.

"These delegates also elect half the county committee, and select delegates to state and national conventions. Apparently this grass-roots democratic approach leads to a better reflection of popular sentiment. . . we didn't nominate a Goldwater.

"The present roster of elected and active Democratic precinct delegates include two engineers, two attorneys, a securities salesman, an insurance agent, the editor of a labor newspaper, and five housewives. The housewives have husbands who include a newspaper feature writer, an engineer, a research scientist, and a high school principal.

"The group is so representative of the community that I am constantly proud of it as an example of citizen participation in government. . . With these two bases . . . a democratic local club and a group of elected precinct delegates. . . we were able to build a remarkable volunteer organization during the last campaign. More than 800 people assisted during the campaign, and 150 worked with us election day.

"These were all volunteers, and many of them contributed towards the expense of the headquarters building. And they were all from the Farmington area.

"The results were gratifying. . . Farmington gave a majority vote to President Johnson, and to Senator Hart. "Mr. Nolan's party, through its dependence upon a system of appointment, lost sight of most American reality as to nominate Barry Goldwater at their last national convention. Perhaps instead of criticizing the Michigan Democrats, Nolan should put

his own political house in order. Citizen participation is a hollow term in a party with appointed precinct captains and no local clubs."
