Stipends vary according to the financial need of the winners, and range from an honorary \$50 entrance award to a \$500 per year grant. Awards continue for the normal length of the student's degree program if his academic record justifies renewal. Each accredited high school is entitled to at least one of the scholarships if a qualified senior applies. The additional awards are granted at large on the basis of state-wide comparisons on the number of applicants from the participating schools. There are no limits on the number of applicants from, or awards to, any one school. In evaluating the applications, emphasis is on character, citizenship, academic record, financial need, and scores made on a competitive test.

## Credit Union Members Show Savings Margin

Federal credit unions in Michigan showed a 13.9 percent gain in assets last year, reaching a new high of \$340,619,000, according to figures released by Neilson H. Bosch, Regional Director, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Chicago. Members' savings (shares) reached a new high of \$302,559,000, which is an average of \$571 each for the 529,832 members of the Federal credit unions in the State. Loans outstanding at the end of the year to FCU members in the state totaled \$269,211,000.

The national figures released by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions revealed that the year 1964 was an exceptionally good year nationwide, with an increase of over \$500 million in savings, representing an increase of 16.4 percent, passing \$4 billion for the first time. Membership in the 50 states, the District of Columbia, the territories and possessions reached 8,692,000 and total assets \$4,549 million. Loans outstanding to members totaled \$3,351 million. During their 30-year history, currently operating Federal credit unions have made loans to their members totaling more than \$34 billion. Federal credit unions are the fastest growing percentage-wise, in terms of assets, savings, and loans of all Federally chartered financial institutions. FCUs are also the largest in number of any class of such financial institutions, totaling 11,278 at the end of 1964.

Credit unions encourage their members to use their share accounts to accumulate savings out of income as a means of building economic security for themselves and their families. In addition, credit unions provide short-term loans for emergency and any other purposes which are useful for their members, such as consolidation of debts, payment of medical bills, and financing higher education. A significant characteristic of credit unions is that their members furnish practically all the funds needed for loans.

The Bureau of Federal Credit Unions, a part of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, is responsible for issuance of Federal credit union charters and supervision and periodic examination of individual credit unions. Mr. Richard A. Walsh serves as the Region V Representative for the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions for the States of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, and Wisconsin.
