

GOP Favors New Laws

At its first meeting, held recently at the Bloomfield Hills Jr. High School, the newly formed GOP County Committee adopted the following resolutions:

IMMIGRATION LAWS: The present national origins quota system not only ignores the claims of basic human needs but is contrary to the best interest of the country. It is highly discriminatory on the basis of race and nationality and makes a mockery of the brave declaration engraved for all to see on the Statue of Liberty.

Public policy should be in harmony with American principles of justice. We favor, therefore, immigration restrictions based solely on considerations of skills, competency and character. We do not, however, believe that the Seller-Hart Bill presently under consideration accomplishes these ends.

RIGHT TO VOTE: The right to vote is a fundamental right of American democracy. Wherever and whenever such a fundamental right is abridged by such capricious and subversive practices as those exemplified by some states and localities, the government should interpose jurisdiction. When necessary, federal registrars should take over the registration of qualified voters. Also, whenever necessary, the constitutional right of peaceful assembly should be enforced wherever this right is not allowed by state or local authorities. We do, furthermore, recommend the prosecution of any or all state or local officials who are responsible for the denial of these constitutional rights.

CITY INCOME TAXES: The Committee went on record as supporting proposed legislation by Senator Robert Huber (D-16) and Representative William Hayward of Royal Oak (R-48) that would eliminate city income taxes on non-residents.

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Auto Checkup Is Set

The 1965 Farmington Vehicle Safety-Check program will be staged Friday and Saturday, June 4 and 5, at two locations in the community, the Plaza Shopping Center (Grand River Avenue just west of Orchard Lake Road) and the Kendallwood Shopping Center (13 Mile Road at Farmington Road).

The vehicle safety-check lanes will open at 12 noon on Friday, June 4, at both the locations in the City of Farmington and the one in Farmington Township. The check lanes, which will be under the supervision of qualified service managers from Farmington automobile dealerships, garage and service station mechanics will be open on Friday until 8 p.m.

The check lanes will be open at both locations on Saturday from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m.
All motorists driving in the Farmington area during the two-day Vehicle Safety-Check program are urged to get their free inspection and join the "Circle of Safety: Check your car, check your driving, check accidents."

Vehicles which pass the safety inspection will receive the 1965 Safety-Check windshield sticker.
General Chairman of the 1965 Farmington Vehicle Safety-Check program is Frank Stefani of the Capital Tire Company, 22843 Orchard Lake Road in Farmington.

All seven of Farmington's automobile dealerships are participating in this year's Vehicle Safety-Check program. They are: Bill Root Chevrolet, Inc., 32715 Grand River Avenue; Danmore Motor Sales, Inc., 22901 Grand River Avenue; Bob Dussan, Inc., 32411 Grand River Avenue; John O'Green Ford, Inc., 30771 Grand River Avenue; Pioneer Oldsmobile, Inc., 33224 Grand River Avenue; Redford Ramblers, Inc., 28801 Grand River Avenue; and Town and Country Dodge, Inc., 31015 Grand River Avenue.

Director of the Public Safety Department for the City of Farmington, Chief Maurice D. Foltz, and Farmington Township Public Chief Irving H. Yakes are both taking active roles in this year's Vehicle Safety-Check program.

"Even our best drivers are poor risks," says Chief Foltz, "if they are driving cars with bad brakes, worn tires, or other neglected items. This voluntary Vehicle Safety-Check program in Farmington gives every motorist a chance to do

his part in making the community a safer place to live."

Chief of Police Yakes adds, "Equally important in our Safety-Check is the challenge to all drivers to check their conduct behind the wheel. Both safe cars and safe drivers are needed to check accidents."

General Chairman Stefani pointed out that "more than a half million vehicles checked in 1964 during the nationwide Vehicle-Check program. Attention to one or more of the items affecting safe driving conditions. The items safety-checked are brakes, front and rear lights (turn signals and stop lights), steering, tires, exhaust system, glass, windshield wipers (and windshield washers), rearview mirror, horn and seat belts.

"Discovering unsafe vehicles now," Stefani says, "will permit owners to have dangerous conditions corrected before they become a factor in a traffic accident. Many motorists don't know they are driving cars that endanger themselves,

their families and their community. The June 4 and 5 ten-point free safety-check is the best way to find out and join the 'Circle of Safety' in 1965."

The Safety-Check in Farmington is part of the annual National Safety-Check for Communities sponsored by the Auto Industries Highway Safety Committee and LOOK magazine, with the cooperation of the Association of State and Provincial Safety Coordinators. Last year, Safety-Checks were conducted in thousands of

communities, counties, millitary installations, industrial plants, governmental agencies, youth groups, new car and tire dealers and many other organizations.

A few of the groups actively supporting this second annual Vehicle-Check program in Farmington are: The Farmington Board of Commerce, The Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Farmington YMCA, the Farmington Optimist Club and other service groups and organizations.
