## Council Shows Heart

According to Dinan, it is "quite expensive and inefficient." Dinan now has permission to seek bids on a piece of mechanized equipment for this operation.

After examining the bids of five car dealers, the Council agreed to purchase from the lowest bidder among them — Torn and Country Dodge — three police cars, one standard car (to be used by the Detective Bureau) and one van type truck. The City traded in four of its older police vehicles as part of the deal.

Acting on the advice of Police Chief Maurice Folz, the Council ruled that for 115 feet going to the north-south alley in back of the buildings on the west side of Farmington Rd. just north of Grand River and parking will be one-way, and traffic will not be permitted on this strip.

As soon as the parking lot to the west of Farmington Rd. is paved and improved the Department of Public Safety will recommend that parking be removed entirely from Farmington Rd. between Grand River and Alta Loma.

It was announced that Fred Seibert has been appointed to the Zoning Board of Appeals, to fill the unexpired term of Councilman Yoder.

June 7 was announced as the date of the public hearing on setting up the special assessment district parking lot north of Grand River and east of Farmington Rd., and the other south of Grand River and west of Farmington Rd.

John Dinan will discuss with the School Board the possibility of getting a crossing guard at the corner of Shawansee and Prospect, during the time it is used by the students. It is regarded as a dangerous corner.

Ernest Sauter of the Farmington Area Library Board came before the Council to discuss the possibility of the City taking over snow-removal duties at the Library, on a time and material basis. The matter will be studied.

The National Safety Council is sponsoring the National Drivers Test, which will be administered on CBS Television from 10 to 11 p.m., on Monday, May 24. According to City Manager Dinan, "This will be one of the most massive one-shot safety communication efforts of all times, and one of the most extensive efforts to educate by television. It should do much to alert licensed drivers to the need for developing defensive skills."

The City Council went on record as encouraging every licensed driver to take the test.
