

Many Unusual Features Offered At Enclosed Westland Center

Like the appearance of a new star, Hudson's Westland stands ready for discovery as the feature attraction in a galaxy of elite shops, landscaped malls and year-round, air-conditioned shopping.

Right, colorful interior decor, distinctive lighting, attractive displays and the traditional complete assortment of Hudson merchandise and services give the newest Hudson's department store a personality likened to one's own home.

Hand-painted murals, authentic antiques, unusual wrought iron displays and attractively coordinated, cheerful colors in the department are set them off as separate little shops.

Yet, careful planning of each of the four floors in Hudson's allows for a logical flow of related merchandise departments on each floor.

Hudson's First Floor carries the following departments: Men's and Boys' Clothing and Shoes; Women's Accessories and Shoes; Cosmetics; Optical; Candy and Gift Wrapping.

The Women's Shoe Department has one of the many unique attractions on this floor. Two large glass chandeliers, imported from Italy, highlight the department.

Lighting plays an important role in all of the other departments with an assortment of round glass globes, colored and clear, installed throughout the store.

Hudson's Second Floor, a mecca for the female shopper, houses fashions and other personal items for the woman. On this floor are dresses, coats, suits, furs, bridal, formal and casual and sportswear children's clothing and shoes; lingerie.

Decor highlighting this floor includes authentic barnwood paneling and antiques. The children's Shoe Department walls have an unusual dimensional effect.

Paintings throughout the store were done by Paris-trained artists.

Many of Hudson's customer services are located on the Second Floor. On the south side of the floor, Hudson's modern beauty salon, cashier, repair center, photo studio, jewelry and credit departments are located in a customer lobby.

Hudson's Westland offers all of the regular customer services including an adjustment bureau; alterations, bridal consultant and registry, dry cleaning, fur repair, gift wrapping, home improvement center, interior decorating studio, radio and television repair, photo finishing.

Hudson's Ticket Service will be located in the Cashier's Office on the Second Floor. Perhaps the unique feature in this spacious department store is the Terrace Restaurant and Garden Buffet, located on the Second Floor overlooking the East Court.

The Terrace Restaurant, catered by Hudson's Restaurant Services, will accommodate 130 persons. The design of the dining area is similar to an open-air restaurant.

Large, yellow awnings, colorful red and white Venetian style lights and dark green carpeting blend with the comfortable table arrangements to give shoppers unequalled leisurely dining pleasure.

The Terrace overlooks the East Court and objects, landscaping and huge fountain which is illuminated with multi-colored lights.

Adjoining the restaurant is a 110-seat Garden Buffet where cafeteria-style service is offered the more hurried shopper.

Entrance to both dining areas is possible from the Second Floor of Hudson's, by a glass-enclosed, hydraulic elevator or landscaped open stairway leading from the East Court or from the lower Concourse.

Hudson's Paint Shop, complete in every detail, is located in the restaurant area.

For Hudson's 1,330 employees, most of whom live in the Westland area, an employee cafeteria is also located on the Second Floor.

Hudson's Third Floor is

dedicated to complete home needs. Home furnishings, china and glassware, pictures, mirrors, furniture, music department, linens, patterns, appliances, yardgoods, curtains

and draperies are located on Third Floor. Once again the department arrangement is designed to facilitate the customer in locating related merchandise.

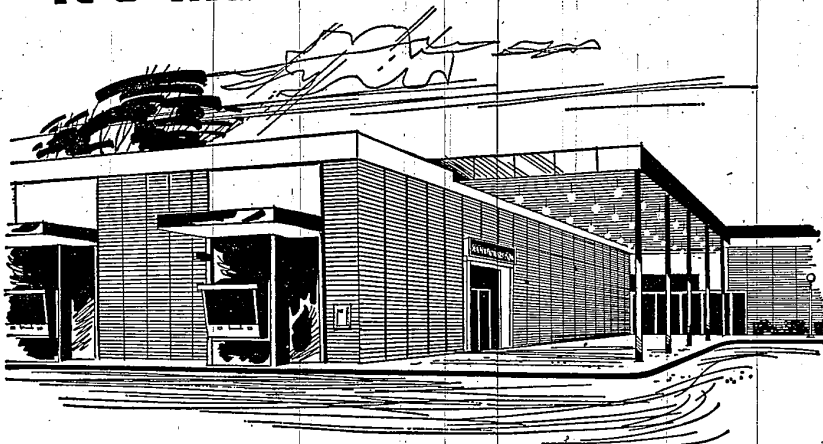

Artists Add Color, Beauty to Visitors

Following are brief descriptions of the 14 special artistic features which will be found in the East and West wings of the connecting Central Mall.

IN THE EAST COURT:

"Column"—A sculptured creation by George Rieck, of East Chatham, N.Y. Approximately 30 feet high, it is formed in steel with a silicon bronze-metallic finish. It consists of a cylindrical base leading to five tapered triangular tubes arms or blades, each mounted on bearings and counter balanced to move slightly with the movement of air currents through its blades.

"The Goose that Laid the Golden Egg" by Samuel Cashman of Farmington, is a low 8-foot wide play sculpture, planned especially for children to climb on. The goose and the sculpture base are of cast tergo. The egg is gilt bronzed.

The clear glass Elevator, designed by the architects, moves slowly within an ornamental forged iron frame between the concourse, main floor and second floor, where it leads directly to Hudson's Terrace Restaurant.

Designed both as a show piece and as a facility for viewing the East Court — as well as carrying passengers to their destinations.

An ornamental Wall Clock by Narendra Patel, of Detroit, is located on the south wall of the East Court. It consists of 12 copper sculptural figures depicting the signs of the Zodiac, which replace numerals on the face of the clock. Each figure is approximately 18 inches square; all are arranged in a 16-foot diameter clock face. The hands are of ornamental copper, of brass and copper with a patina finish, on a cast terrazzo base.

"Jack in the Beanstalk", a sculpture by Samuel Cashman, of Farmington, is approximately 20 feet high, and fabricated of brass and copper with a patina finish, on a cast terrazzo base.

The Pool and Fountain, designed by the architects, measure 28 feet in diameter. The

fauntals is designed to operate with a full range of display effects, including: colored lights, sometimes cascading to a height of 20 feet, all controlled by an automatic sequencing device.

The East Court Clerestory, also designed by the architects, is a stained glass window, 170 feet long, alternating with clear and obscure glass to reflect interesting color effects.

IN THE CENTRAL MALL: "The Acrobat"—A sculpture by Earl Krenzien, of Detroit, is 12 feet high, fabricated in bronze with oxidized silver color finish. The base is in cast stone and is mounted in a landscaped planter.

"Large Framed Figure", a bronze sculptured modern concept by Fritz Koenig, who lives in Germany, is approximately four feet high, mounted on a precast concrete base at the east end of the Central Mall. Purchased from The J. L. Hudson Galleries.

The ornamental Bird Cage reaches from the floor to the ceiling. It was designed by the architects and is installed in a tropical planter at the east end of the Central Mall.

The colorful Aquarium, also designed by the architects, was developed with the engineering assistance of San Diego, Calif. firm, and installed by a local firm. Rising to a height of almost eight feet, its fish life is expected to attract much attention.
