He said he has communicated with the Oakland County Probate Court Judges Donald Adams and Norman Barnard who are responsible for appointing the members of the Committee. Hall said he was sure the Court would take proper action to correct the situation.

But the Supervisor would not go along with the idea of expressing official censure of Eddy. He obviously did not feel such action was the proper function of the Board. He said, "I have some doubt whether we should, as a Board, take action chastising this man. I get enough rough treatment in the press without wanting to give it to another man."

Among the Board members, Trustee Thomas A. Nolan and Treasurer Elise Avery took particularly dim views of Eddy's sex theory.

In the end it was decided that the Board would withhold its share of the funds for

the Committee subject to ap-

proving approval. Contacted by the Observer, Eddy took the news calmly. He had obviously been expecting a shoe to fall.

He said that at the last meeting of the Youth Guidance Committee, in the presence of Edward Flood, Oakland County Director of the Program, "I made it known that I was aware that my controversial and well-publicized views might make it appear to some people that I should not be Chairman of this Committee, and that I recognized that whatever the merits of my views it might be better that a person with less controversial views would be better qualified to serve as Chairman. I indicated that if the Court or the Committee felt this way, I would not take it personally if they asked for my resignation."

The letter also stated that school taxes in the amount of \$934.64 would be lost should the local dealer sell the dairy.

Two board members, Sylvia Schwartz and George Nabstoll went on record Monday evening as still favoring keeping the business in the community even though the local bidder was not low. Richard Peters also voted to award the bid to Farmington Dairy two weeks ago, but did not along with the majority of the board in refusing to reverse the decision Monday evening.

Vern Fisher entered the discussion offering strong support for awarding the contract to the lowest, acceptable bidder when competitive bids are called for.

Fisher offered a motion which was seconded by Barbara Leland calling for a letter to be written to each of the persons signing the protest. Content of the proposed letter would explain the competitive bidding procedures that the Board has followed. The motion was supported by Peters, Leland Clifford and Herbert Neal. Nabstoll and Mrs. Schwartz voted no.

The protest letter was signed by Henkle's of Farmington's Wesley House of Music, Sidney Robbins of Penny Wise, Conroy Bradley Pharmacy, Norma Monroe, Dr. H. Telle, Margaret McGregor, Danish Shop, Farmington Hobby, Decor Suburban Paint and Wallpaper Co., Budde's Sport Shop, Towne Toggery, Professional Park Pharmacy and White House Valet.
