

Vagnozzi Asks House For More Representation On Board of Supervisors

Farmington Democratic Club Chairman Aldo Vagnozzi has asked to appear before a legislative committee to argue for an end to the shortchanging of Farmington Township's representation on the Oakland County Board of Supervisors.

Vagnozzi has requested an opportunity to appear before the House Apportionment Committee which is holding a series of hearings on legislation which would re-empower the county boards of supervisors to hasten their representation on population.

The present system limits a township's representation on the county board to a single supervisor regardless of the number of people who live in that township. Thus, Farmington Township, with more than 250,000 people according to the 1960 census, is limited to the same single representative as the county's smallest town with fewer than 2,000 people.

"Farmington Township has grown in population since 1960 which means that the voice on the county level is further diluted in comparison to areas which have not experienced similar growth," Vagnozzi said.

Vagnozzi recalled that he had made the fight for equal representation one of his main campaign goals when he ran for Farmington Township Supervisor last Fall. At that time Vagnozzi pointed out that Farmington Township would have a better chance to get improved county services if it had the representation it was entitled to on the county board.

Supervisors May Get New Status

Farmington City Manager John Dignan has recommended to the Farmington City Council that it authorize Mayor W. V. Brotherton to sign an amendment to the State Highway Maintenance Contract as recommended by the State Highway Dept., pertaining to utilizing the maintenance superintendent in actual cost involved with maintenance. Under this setup, he would be considered in the 9.5 percent overhead, unless the superintendent is actually doing work other than supervising.

Dignan believes the 9.5 percent overhead is large enough to include supervisory personnel in connection with the maintenance program.

Livonia Schools Need Librarians

The Livonia school system, which has a fortunate record of attracting new teachers at times when many other school districts are reporting shortages, is finding it difficult to fill all of its authorized slots for school librarians.

Mrs. Viola K. Fitch, head of the Department of Instructional Materials Services, reports that two of her authorized elementary school librarians, are unutilized as the 1985-86 school year begins.

Mrs. Fitch said that only elementary schools with enrollments of 900 or above could hope to start the year with a full-time librarian.

"It is an unfortunate situation and this shortage places a heavier burden on all librarians in the system," Mrs. Fitch said. "This is a time when an accelerated flow of books, magazines, recordings, and films to our schools gives us better and more materials than we have ever before had in our district."

The Livonia personnel office, Mrs. Fitch pointed out, is working closely with her office to secure additional certified school librarians.

BOOST FOR SR. CITIZENS! Washington OKs Local Program; Paves Way for More Federal Aid

Livonia's proposed development for 70 units of senior citizens housing got another shot in the arm last week, as the Housing and Home Finance Agency announced the reauthorization of this city's "Workable Program for Community Improvement."

John P. McCollum, regional administrator for the federal agency, advised Mayor Harvey Moeke and City Council that the reauthorization will be effective until Aug. 1, 1986.

Before most federal aid programs can be instituted in a city, the "Workable Program" must be approved. Much of the financial aid for the 70-unit senior citizens housing project will come from the federal government.

Moeke explained, "The development and approval of a Workable Program provides the community with a plan of action through which private and public local resources can be used to eliminate the present blight, and foster local development. The Program is divided into seven major elements - codes and ordinances, comprehensive community plan, neighborhood analysis, administrative organization, financing, housing for displaced families and citizen participation.

"Each element constitutes an important segment in providing the community with an overall plan for development."

Highway Dept. OKs Contract On Curb Repair

The Michigan State Highway Department has awarded the contract for curb repair on Grand River Avenue through the City. Eight thousand, three hundred feet of curbing has been allocated for this contract and the State will set up priorities based on the condition of the existing curbing to be removed. The work should be completed within a two week period.

\$116,288 for OCC Student Loans
