Plans Special Historic Display

National Bank to Brighten Festival With Souvenir Coins

The National Bank of Detroit began its four-day observance of the Plymouth Fall Festival with the issuance of a special commemorative coin as a souvenir of the community's annual festival.

Two days of open house activities, featuring special historic displays and old fashioned costumes, are scheduled for regular banking hours Thursday and Friday at the NBD-Plymouth Office on Main Street.

Plymouth group vice president Floyd A. Kehrli said the historic displays have been gathered from bank archives and from material on loan from the Plymouth Historical Society. They trace the history and growth of banking in the community and illustrate the development through the years of NBD facilities as the city's local bank.

The NBD-Plymouth Office will also introduce a new Plymouth group banking brochure this week. It will issue the souvenir coins through the bank on Thursday and Friday and at its Festival Wagon display in Kellogg Park on Sunday and Monday.

A featured display at the NBD open house will be a 1941 Century coin press from the internationally famous Money Museum collection at Nation-

al Bank of Detroit. The press was used to strike privately issued coins (larger to the type of sovereign half dollar token struck for Founders Days) following the Civil War.

Coining presses played an important role in the history of coinage. The screw-type press

was invented in the Elizabethan era (16th Century), but few minted coins before 1700.

The first coining press used in the Philadelphia Mint operated on the screw-drive principle. Until 1830 all United States coins were hand-struck on screw-type coining presses.

The privately issued gold coins minted in the gold fields of Alaska, California, Colorado, Utah, North and South Carolina and Georgia during the 19th Century were frequently struck on coining presses almost identical to the Money Museum operated coin presses.

In some instances, water or horse power were used to turn the screw shaft. During the Civil War, cent-sized copper tokens issued by merchants were also produced on screw-operated coin presses.

The coin press on exhibit at the National Bank of Detroit was manufactured by the Edmund Company of Providence, Rhode Island. It bears three patent dates: June 22, 1869; November 7, 1871; and December 14, 1875.

Nursing School Lists 3 Classes

Starting September 27, Plymouth Children's Nursery will have three classes of three to five-year-old girls and boys scrambling up the front steps to begin another year.

With about 20 children in each class, the day begins with a "free play" time in the bright sunny rooms. Climbing bars, trucks, trains, blocks, bikes, wagons, art work, dolls, puzzles, clay, a play house and

costumes are all used by the children for the first hour. Then with the help of three assisting mothers and the teacher the children put away the toys. Mothers prepare "juice time" while the teacher reads a story, teaches a song or finger-play to those children who are interested.

Children who would rather continue playing may do so in the "quiet area" with books, puzzles, games or dolls. Juice and crackers are served at child sized tables and then if weather permits, the children play outside on the playground or have group activity games inside the school.

Plymouth Children's Nursery is a co-operative nursery located at the corner of Warren and Haggerty roads. Tuition cost for one child is \$9.50 per month for two half day sessions per week, and \$13.75 per month for three half day sessions per week.

Plymouth Dept. Public Works Were you one of the Plymouth residents disturbed by the rust in your water during the early part of last week? The Department of Public Works wishes to thank all for the way this unavoidable situation was accepted. A power failure at the well field early Sunday morning forced the DPW to reduce the pressure in the mains while correcting the failure. Then when the water was turned on it caused surges that brought rust throughout the city mains.

We realize it was an unhappy situation for all but it was one of those things that couldn't be avoided and we hope the situation is back to normal by now. At least there have been no complaints for the past three or four days.

Menhville crews were busy cleaning the downtown business section and work was continued at the parks and playgrounds. The regular mowing and cleaning at the cemetery kept men busy there for several days.

Dutch Elm wood was picked up from the various places where diseased trees had been cut down. Major and minor streets were cold patched.

Painting and repairing of park benches and tables was one of the major items for the week. Goldsmith, between Sheldon and Lena, was graded and gravel hauled in to repair that section of the street. 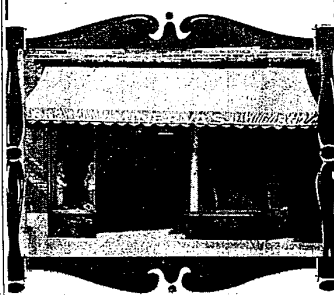

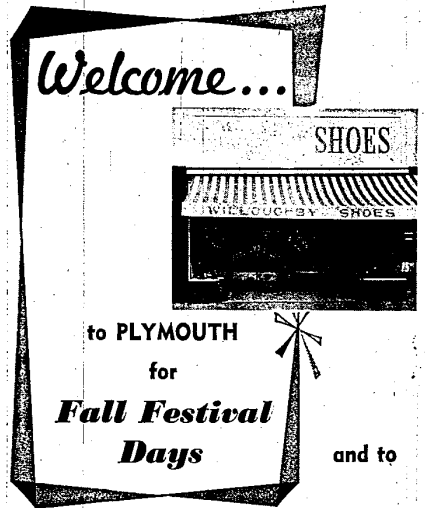
