

Juniors Form Area Grid Loop

Adult groups of "too much travel" have been removed from Little League football this fall in Garden City, Nankin, Livonia and Farmington.

These communities have splintered off from the All American Football League to operate as a nine-member Western Suburban Junior Football League for the 9-to-12-year-old brand of fall sports.

Travel was the principal reason given by officials of the new league for withdrawing to form a "neighborly" conference. The All American last fall operated with 17 member communities, reaching from Riverview on the south to St. Clair Shores on the northeast and as far west as Nankin and Livonia.

As a result, Nankin, Livonia and Garden City withdrew to form the nucleus of the new loop, and "sold" Farmington on entering a new franchise, called the "Mistlet" Farmington High School field will serve as "home" for the newcomers.

Garden City also has a single member representative in the league. The Garden City Hornets will call the Legion Field their home base.

Nankin has two entrants, the Rockets and the Jets, who share Nankin Junior High as their home park. The two Nankin clubs are scheduled to meet on the final day of the season, November 7.

Livonia has five members in the league, the same as a year ago when travel imposed special problems. The Livonia Falcons, Hawks, Blue Jays, Eagles and Cardinals all will use Ford Field, with occasional hosting at Hydromatic and at least one game on the Bell Creek field.

As for additional cost, each team underwrites its own financing for uniforms, equipment, insurance, travel and game costs, so the individual member burden remains the same under either setup.

So a lot of residents and friends in the area are going to get an opportunity to buy Sanders candy—with nine clubs ringing doorbells starting Sept. 18.

Since the beginning of little football in the Detroit area, all funds for equipment, insurance and other expenses have been raised by the boys themselves in a candy sale during the last two weeks of September, actually the first two weeks of the playing season.

This year, the Western Suburban Junior Football League plans to open its financing candy sale on September 18.
