

City Gets New Snow Removers

Farmington will have snow removal service on its streets this winter, but G and C, Inc. will not provide it. That company has indicated it plans to discontinue service here this winter—thus ending a relationship of about five years.

At its meeting on Monday night, Oct. 4, the City Council agreed on a substitute—John's Landscaping Service. The new company's rates are 12 cents a running foot for sidewalks, and a minimum of \$500 for an entire season. The company says that when the snow reaches one-half inch in depth from Dec. 1 through April 1, they are in a position to clear sidewalks.

City Manager John Dlan recommended John's to the council after checking on its past performance. It has worked in Detroit for 10 years, and in Dearborn Heights for three.

Its equipment consists of three service and one tractor with blade. The Jeeps are equipped with five-foot wide sweeping units and tractor with seven-foot blade used for driveways and parking lots.

Plan Big Rec Program

Plans have been made for the Farmington City Recreation Department to begin its fall program during the week of Oct. 11, 1965.

The program will consist of Adult Education and Farmington Area Recreation Community programs, Square Dancing, Duplicate Bridge and separate gymnastic activities for adult male, female, and the youth of the city will be featured.

All adult activities will be held at Farmington Junior High School, Cloverdale Elementary School will be the site used for the youth of our community, aged eight through 12. Older children can enroll in the Intramural or GAA activities provided by the Farmington Public Schools.

Evas Bageris, Department Director, stated that "The recreation department is indeed fortunate to have been able to obtain the services of distinguished personnel in the area we have scheduled."

Master points and fractions will be awarded to winners according to the ACBL schedule and the number of tables in play. In the event that bridge franchise does not arrive at the time the first session, winners will be reimbursed their entry fee. The cost for each meeting will be one dollar.

Three gym teachers of the Farmington Public Schools will operate the athletic activities of the program. Mrs. Mary Keen will conduct the ladies' gymnastic program designed to promote good health and the shedding of unwanted pounds and inches.

Dave Catherman will direct exercise and indoor sports for the adult males of the community. Youngsters will be shown how to have fun under the direction of Mr. William Mason. All parts of the gymnastic program will be free of charge and registration will not be necessary.
