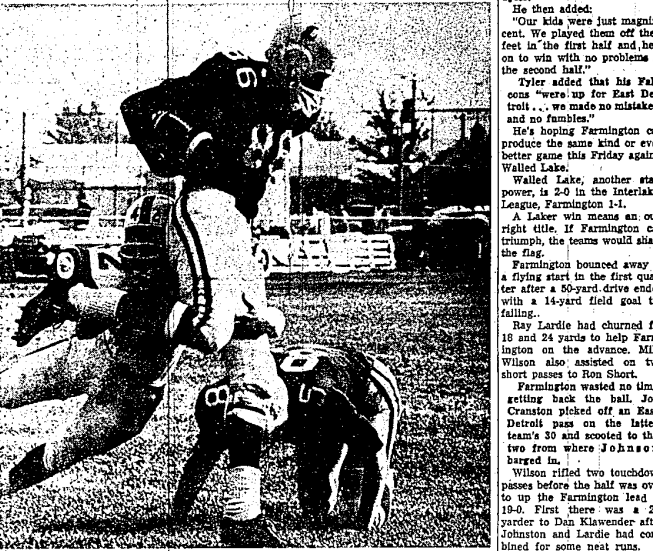

The stock of Chris Hawkins is rising as one of the fleetest school football backs in the area. For that matter the state. It was Hawkins and Hawkins on the ground and Dave Wilson pegging like never before last Saturday as Clarencville celebrated homecoming by drubbing Clarkston, 28-6.

Thus Clarencville did something that hasn't happened at the Middlebelt Road school in five years - win its second game in one season. They have had some lean times - football speaking - at Clarencville in recent years. A couple of years saw no victories... two other times the Trojans had to settle for just one triumph.

But, as Coach Ralph Tenby put it after Friday's victory: "The Trojans never performed better offensively and there could be no faulting the defense."

The big man for Clarencville had to be Hawkins. "He scored two touchdowns. Very important, he personally lugged the ball for 173 yards in 21 carries for an 8.3 yard average."

This effort had to set a school record for one game. Few prep or college or pros ever achieve such a figure. In five games, Hawkins now has accumulated for over 625 yards. He could wind up close to a 1,000 for the season.

All together, Clarencville's offense clicked for 344 yards in 53 plays. The Trojans were 217 yards on the ground and 113 through the air.

EAST LANSING-The leadership in a holly-contested series between two Big Ten rivals and another step toward a possible conference title will go to the winner of the Michigan State-Purdue game, Saturday at Lafayette.

The series between the two schools, now standing at 9-9, has been spiced with major upsets. It was the Bolleermakers who stopped State's 28-game winning streak in 1953, and it was the Spartans who robbed Purdue of a trip to the Rose Bowl in 1957.
