**Always Remove Old Adhesive
To Reglue Veneered Pieces**

When the veneer of a table
top or other piece of furniture
comes loose, it can be suc-
cessfully glued back to its base
if the old adhesive is removed.
Sometimes it is easier said
than done. It is especially dif-
ficult if the veneer is only slight-
ly lifted from the surface and
there is no apparent way to
scrape off the old glue.

A method sometimes recom-
mended is to steam the veneer
with a hot iron after first wet-
ting the let-over cement.

It may be that an expert can
perform this task without damag-
ing the veneer. Don't try it!

There are any one of half a
dozen reasons why it may cause
trouble, entirely aside from the
fact that it won't even work un-
less the glue is water-solvent.

The safest procedure is to lift
the veneer very carefully to the
point where there is some resis-
tance.

Push a putty knife spatula
into the opening and scrape
gently.

If there still appears to be
some hardened glue there,
place sandpaper between the
veneer and base and rub it
back and forth as best you
can, using the flat part of the
putty knife to assist you.

If the opening is very narrow,
it may take you a while to get
results, but this is better than
failing to make a good repair.

Use a tiny artist's brush,
typewriter brush or something
similar to clean out the area,

then apply new glue with a wire
or anything that will get be-
tween the veneer and the base.

Place a cloth over the top of
the repair and allow on books
until the glue sets.

Just how long this will be de-
pends on the type of glue used,
so read the label on the contain-
er to determine the setting time.

For safety's sake, allow even
longer than is recommended.

Regluing the loose veneer may
be part of an over-all finishing
job.

In that event, removal of the
old glue is the water-solvent
tackling the veneer. But putting
on the new finish should come
later.

**PO Department Acts
To End Rust Problem**

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Ac-
cording to an announcement by
the United States Post Office,
the Department now has "ex-
pects to save more than one million
dollars a year in vehicle main-
tenance through a new rust-
proofing process."

In the last year, 14,000 postal
vehicles have been sprayed with
a rust-inhibiting petro-
leum. The rust-resistant mate-
rial is sprayed through the holes
drilled in the hidden panel
areas. It is in these areas

where salt, moisture, and acids
collect to cause rust and cor-
rosion.

"The anti-rust compound
prevents corrosion from occur-
ring and should keep a vehi-
cle nearly rust free for a
minimum of four years,"

A. W. Smith, Post Office
Department's Chief of Vehi-
cles Branch told the National
Petroleum Refiners Associa-
tion Convention at the Rosen-
velt Hotel in New York recently.

Wedin said that two-thirds of
the 47,000 vehicle postal fleet
is located in areas of the coun-
try where rust and corrosion is
a major problem. Approx-
imately 40 per cent of the body
repairs for these vehicles is
attributable to rust. He esti-
mated a first year potential
savings at \$234,000.

"The greatest expenditure
must be made during the first
year," Wedin said. "After that,
our savings should run over a
million dollars annually."

Corrosion does its highest
damage in the north where salt
is used on slick roads, and in
the coastal regions where there
is a high salt content in the air.

Wedin said. The new process
also stops further rust in older
vehicles.

**Fall Brings
Added Fire
Hazards**

Fire is still a very real threat
around the home, even in this
day of fireproof building mate-
rials and extensive fire preven-
tion programs.

This is especially true in the
fall, when dry leaves, grass, and
other foliage add to the threat.

If you haven't already, now is
the time to take stock of the fire
safety practices at your house.

This list of tips might suggest
ways to help you prevent fires
or fight them, if they get start-
ed—Don't burn leaves or other
refuse in an open fire when
other ways are available.

If possible, burn these dry
materials in a perforated galva-
nized steel rubbish burner with
a close-fitting cover. That way,
gusty autumn winds won't blow
sparks and burning embers around.

—If you do start an open fire,
make arrangements ahead of
time to control it.

—One good "switch in time" is
to fill several galvanized steel
pails with water or sand before
you strike the first match. With
this precaution, you can douse
a fire before it gets away from
you.

—Store gasoline, turpentine,
kerosene, cleaners, and other
flammable fluids in leak-proof
metal containers, away from
sources of heat or sparks.

You'll want to drain the pow-
er mower after the last grass
cutting this fall. Use a galva-
nized steel fuel can to store the
gas. Do the same with the
cleaners and solvents you'll be
using for fall painting and tool
cleaning.

—Give the basement, garage,
and other areas where refuse is
apt to collect good fall clean-
ing—and make a resolution to
keep them clean.

Discard or burn old newspa-
pers, rags, and other trash
which might cause a fire. Home
workshops, with their accumu-
lations of scrap lumber, sawdust,
and other flammable materials,
should be cleaned. By keep-
ing a galvanized steel trash can
handy, you can store the waste
safely until it can be hauled out.

**Follow 5-Step
Fire Prevention
Home Program**

Here are five steps the home-
owner can take to help prevent
a fire from starting in and
around the house:

1. Dispose of trash and rubbish regularly. Don't let it accumulate around the house.
2. Store in fire-safe galvanized steel containers until it is picked up by refuse collectors.
3. Keep attic, basement and closets free of old clothing, curtains, drapes, lamp shades, mattresses, newspapers and old magazines.
4. Don't empty ashtrays until the contents are completely cold. Use ashtrays which are large and deep enough to keep burning cigarettes from falling out onto the floor.
5. Have your heating and cooking equipment checked periodically. Chimneys also should be checked to be sure they are not clogged.

Store all paints, thinners and solvents in tightly closed metal cans, away from any heat source.

**Here Are Tips On Safe Way
To Store Gasoline and Oil**

Accidents involving the stor-
age and handling of fuel could
be eliminated if all gasoline and
oil were stored in fire-safe fuel
containers instead of glass bottles or
other substitute containers, safe-
ty officials agree.

Galvanized steel fuel cans
should have tight-fitting caps
and convenient pouring spouts
to facilitate handling by any
member of the family. The caps
on these rust-resistant fuel cans
lock in dangerous fumes that
present a fire hazard.

The pouring spout should
come into contact with the tank
when handling gasoline. This

serves to ground the spout and
prevents the formation of static
electricity, which could ignite
the fuel.

A small spark from a cigaret
or match is enough to ignite
gasoline. Adults should adhere
to strict safety procedures when
handling gasoline not only to
prevent a deadly fire, but to set
a good example for children.

Fire and safety officials em-
phasize that gasoline and oil
present no safety hazard if
stored in steel fuel cans and
handled properly.
