

### Baby Sitting Clinic Begins

The Farmington Jaycee Auxiliary is once again sponsoring a baby sitting clinic this year. It will begin on Wednesday, Oct. 20, at 7:30 p.m. at the C. E. Dunckel Jr. High School on 12 Mile Road.

"Child Care" will be presented at the first session, with Mrs. Ralph Mattmueller, a registered nurse, assisted by Auxiliary Sub-Chairman Mrs. Roger Lancia. They will discuss the feeding, dressing, and handling of children of various ages.

Mrs. Harlan Lorenz will discuss "Safety as a sitter" at the second session. A Farmington Police Officer will discuss "emergencies" — how to avoid them and how to react to them.

There will also be a discussion of the "sitter responsibility." In the third session, Mrs. Warren McKenzie, a registered nurse, and Auxiliary Sub-Chairman Mrs. John Richardson will discuss first aid.

Emergency measures that baby sitters should know: Artificial respiration will be the subject of the fourth session. A written examination will be given at this session.

There will be refreshments at the closing lecture, which will be given by a school teacher, on how to amuse and entertain children.

Those who attend all five sessions and pass the examination will be given a certificate.

## Apartment Hearing Set

The Farmington City Council will hold a public hearing on Monday, Nov. 15, on the question of whether to rezone 6.1 acres of property on the north side of the west end of Lakeview, from C-2 General Commercial and R-1, One Family, to R-3 Multiple Family District.

## LWV Studies Legislatures

"Should the federal constitution be amended to permit apportioning state legislatures on lines other than one-man, one-vote?"

This topic was discussed and debated at East Lansing recently by three well-known experts in a presentation: Dr. Charles Adrain, Chairman, Department of Political Science, Michigan State U. University; Cary Brown, Republican Senator from Kalamazoo, attorney, and former con-con delegate; and Theodore Sachs, Detroit attorney.

The program had been arranged by the League of Women Voters of Michigan to help implement the national League item on apportionment adopted last May as an emergency study by Leagues throughout the country.

Mrs. Saenger Warren, and Mrs. William Smith, President, of the Farmington League were among the 37 local Leagues represented at the workshop.

The first unit meetings of the League are being planned for Oct. 27 and 28.

The topic for discussion will be Apportionment, presented by Mrs. Allen Hurd, Mrs. Bernard Hurd, Mrs. Irving Gilbert and Mrs. Aldo Vagozzi who will be on the panel. Mrs. Harold Gibson will present a report on the U. N. which is also being studied by the League.
