## Teachers

In Farmington is \$3,700, compared to a high of \$9,800 in Birmingham. All other neighboring districts in this comparison are above \$9,000 yearly except Waterford.

The operating cost per pupil in Farmington has steadily risen in the past five years, demanding the three mill extension. School authorities say: The 1962 budget showed cost per student to be \$365. This year it is anticipated to be \$470.

Next Wednesday's article will discuss Proposal C—a Four Mill Increase for Operating Funds. The Observer also will publish an editorial urging a yes vote on all three special school election proposals.

## Chief Criticizes 10 Mile Signs

According to Farmington Police Chief Maurice Foltz, a traffic survey of Farmington Road south from 10 Mile Road "indicates that present warning and regulatory signs are inadequate and confusing."

Foltz says that a traffic engineer of the Oakland County Road Commission has stated he will install a proper warning sign just outside of the City limits. "It is further indicated," says Foltz that the city should continue a double yellow (no passing) striping south from 10 Mile Road to Shiloh as well as Street."
