Outdoor "Laboratories" Can Teach Conservation

Who among us doesn't like to wander through natural thickets and ravines, explore a wildlife sanctuary, walk through quiet nature trails, or sit beside a shallow pond watching the frogs and water bugs?

All this is everyday enjoyment in Ann Arbor, according to Dr. Bill Stapp, conservation consultant for the Ann Arbor Public Schools. Dr. Stapp recently appeared before the Farmington Board of Education to tell what is being done in conservation in Ann Arbor.

Conservation has been introduced into grades six through twelve, he said, through social studies, biology and other sciences. Pupils in the sixth grade begin to learn about water conservation and the interdependence of communities upon a water supply. They learn all the uses of water and take field trips to see first hand some of the uses.

IN GRADES SEVEN through twelve, stream biology is introduced and the causes of water pollution are studied. The problems of conservation and the responsibilities of government, local, state and national, are discussed. In studying history, students learn what changes have been made in water and land use and in wild life and how it has influenced the current conservation policy.

Dr. Stapp says that the introduction of conservation adds a new dimension to the curriculum and creates a greater

A CARPETED library was specified, as well as the carpeting in the library at the new Larkshire School was approved for experimental purposes and the school was not yet been used. The Board favored the carpeting for the same reasons as that in the Larkshire library.
