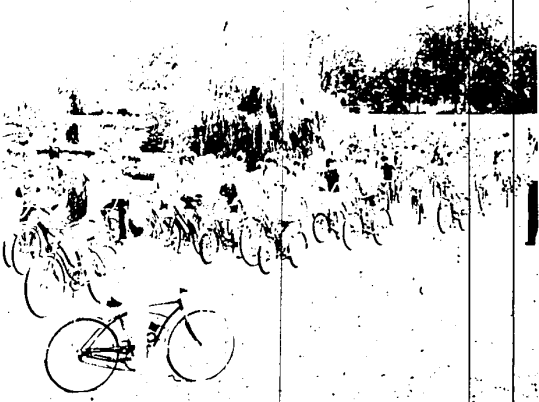




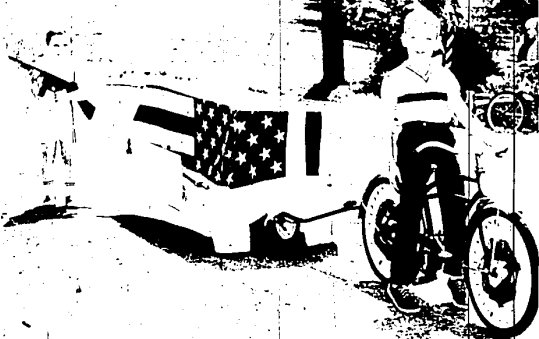

**Noted Veteran In This Area Dies June 29**

Charles C. Willard of 21453 Oxford Avenue, Farmington Township passed away on Tuesday morning, June 29, in St. Mary Hospital in Livonia following a brief illness.

Born February 7, 1897 in Warsaw, New York the son of Jay V. and Elizabeth Willard, Willard attended school in New York and on October 13, 1945 was united in marriage to Marie H. Mulcare in Detroit.

Mr. and Mrs. Willard had lived in Farmington for the past twenty years. He was a machinist with the Simmons Bolter & Machine Company in Detroit.

Willard was a veteran of World War I and had long been active in veteran affairs in and around Farmington. He was a Life Member and Past Commander of Groves-Walker Post 346. He also served as Chaplain for fifteen years as was on the Memorial Home Board for ten years. He was a member of World War 1 Veteran Barracks 152, a member of Oakland County Volture 811 of the 40 & 8 and past Chief de Gase and a member of the Ritual Team for 25 years. Willard also served on the Farmington Auxiliary Police force.

A memorial service conducted by the 40 & 8 was held on Thursday evening, July 1, at 8 p.m. in the Chapel of the Thayer Funeral Home, Farmington. Funeral services took place from the Funeral Home on Friday at 1 p.m. with Rev. David R. Stone of Farmington First Methodist Church officiating. A full military committal service followed in Oakwood Cemetery, Farmington.

Surviving besides Mrs. Willard are a step-son, Thomas Mulcare of Chicago, Illinois and three grandchildren.

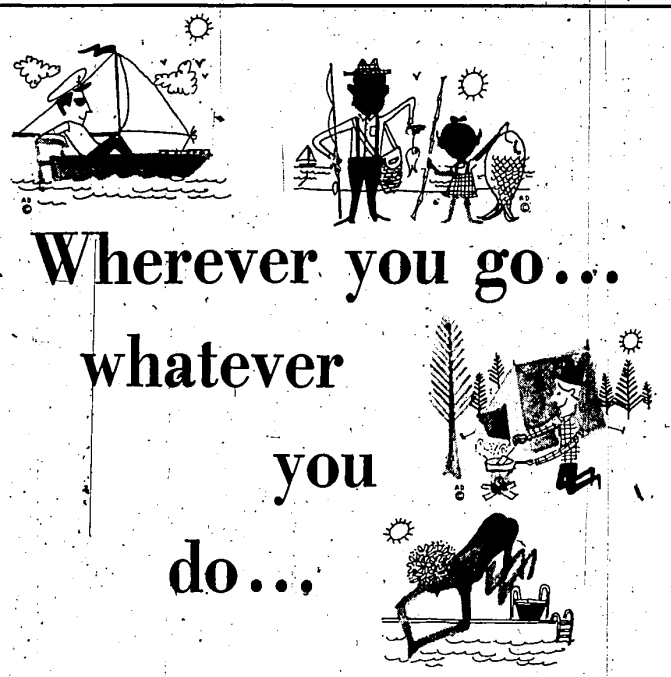
### Letters to The Editor
