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months per employee is being paid by the district.

Supt. G. V. Harrison reported the 1963-64 Oakland County average percentages for the major categories of the budget. All categories in the Farmington District were the same or lower, with the exception of fixed charges which were 1 per cent higher. Here again, the employee insurance was the difference. Instructional expenditures were 8 per cent lower and plant operation was almost 2 per cent lower than the county average.

THE MONEY To satisfy the budget will be forthcoming from two main sources — tax revenues from personal and real taxes from property owners in the school district and from State School Aid. It has been estimated that current tax receipts will bring in \$2,800,726, almost \$400,000 more than last year. The amount expected to be realized in State Aid payments is \$3,572,500, which is more than \$800,000

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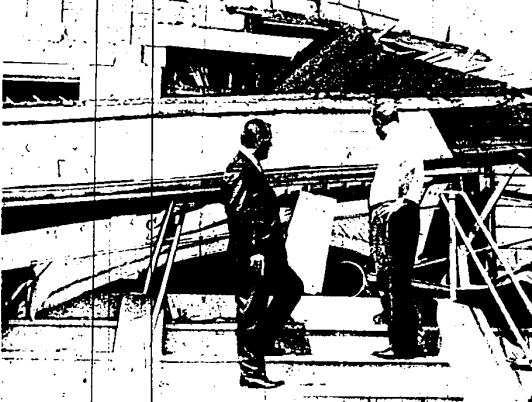

Councilmen Ask for Many Improvements

When the City Council met Tuesday night, 10111 around to the miscellaneous business section near the end of the agenda the various individual councilmen had many questions and suggestions for improvements to make. As Mayor Sandy Brotherton stated, the long holiday weekend gave him and other councilmen a lot of time to travel around the city and observe.

The mayor and Councilman John Allen both felt that a major effort should be put forth to get weeds cut down and particularly along major roadways. City Manager Dinan explained that most of these roadways were under county jurisdiction. He agreed with Allen to get better service but not with his suggestion that the city do the work itself if the county did not.

FHS Addition Plans Set

Final plans for an addition to Farmington High School were approved by the Board of Education Tuesday night. The addition will be a "multi-purpose" room in that it will be used in many different ways.

To be located on the north side, or back, of the gymnasium, the room will serve as a badly needed additional teaching station for gym. A folding partition will allow use of the room by two groups if wanted. Wrestling activities will be located here instead of in the cafeteria as in the past.

DURING THE NOON hour the room will accommodate a variety of activities for their lunch time. Mainly designed for students who carry their lunches, a snack bar for the sale of milk and possibly soft drinks has been incorporated.

After school hours the room will serve adult groups and can be used for school activities and community uses which don't require as much space as the gymnasium.

During basketball games and other activities in the gymnasium, the addition will serve as a lobby. The architect has planned for a future swimming pool if it is possible to get that entry to the pool may be made through the addition.

Bids for the addition will be opened at 7:30 p.m. on July 26.

The plan calls for concrete parking sections to be provided in front of business places where needed directly off the highway between the roadway and the sidewalks at the front of the business establishments themselves.

CITY MANAGER John Dinan estimated that the cost of providing such parking would probably run between \$12 to \$15 per foot lot to the benefiting business place. Questioned by councilmen on whether this cost could be financed, he made it clear that it would be possible for the business places to pay their obligation on a special assessment basis over a ten year period.

Councilman John Allen suggested that a public hearing be held prior to any action on this plan so that the proposal could be explained thoroughly to all affected property owners. There was unanimous agreement that this should be done but not until more detailed engineering has been completed to determine the areas where additional parking would be needed and more accurate cost estimates could be developed.

It should be noted that there is already a parking problem on a substantial portion of the north side of Grand River from the First Methodist Church at Warner Street eastward. On-street parking is so forbidden on Grand River at some points on the south side of the main artery highway.

At Tuesday night's meeting, Dinan stated that bids would be opened to be taken before the end of July and that work on the improvements would not be able to be started until sometime in August.

Action on the improvement projects also prompted discussion on the reasons for the delays in getting the raising of the old Elks Temple completed. The city manager stated that the contractors had run into some equipment failures but that he expected them to be back in and working on the job yet this week.

It was agreed that if the contractors were not back on the job by Monday of this coming week city DPW men should be put on the job and moneys withheld from the demolition contractors.

July 4 Weekend Hwy. Accident Mars Holiday

Although Farmington Township recorded one of the quietest holiday weekends on record over the long Fourth of July period with no personal injury accidents and only six minor highway mishaps, the city had its holiday traffic record marred as the weekend drew to a close on Monday.

Three persons were injured as their car skidded out of control at the curve on Orchard Lake Road just north of Grand River Avenue and struck a parked car in front of the Farmington Sheet Metal building, 22456 Orchard Lake Road, driving the parked car through the front of the building.

CITY POLICE measured visible skid marks extending 252 feet in front of the crash scene and estimated the car had been traveling at a high rate of speed in the 35-mile-an-hour zone.

Driver of the car, John F. Sorna, 18, of 20224 Purlingbrook in Livonia, did not have an operator's license and admitted to police that he never had one. He was treated for injuries and released at Botsford General Hospital. Three passengers in Sorna's car were also taken to Botsford General Hospital.

City Policeman Fiois Break-In

Farmington City Police Officer Glen T. Harding, Jr., foiled a burglary at the Mocar Products Company, 33080 West Eight Mile Road in the City, on Monday morning, July 5.

Officer Harding was on patrol checking buildings in the area of Mocar Products at 2:15 a.m. on Monday when he observed the rear, overdoor of the Mocar building opened slightly, enough to show someone was in the building. He got out of his squad car and saw two figures vanishing towards the front of the building as he approached. He reached the front of the building in time to see one of the culprits, later apprehended by Livonia Police, flee around the opposite side of the building after getting out of the front door.

OFFICER HARDING arrested Paul M. Agar, 20, of 5468 Joseph Casspeck in Detroit, before he had a chance to flee with his companion who turned out to be his older brother, Teddy C. Agar, 29, of the same address. The younger Agar was nabbed by Officer Harding as he stood by a coke machine in the front office of the Mocar Products building. He surrendered without a struggle. The older Agar was picked up by Livonia police at 4:30 a.m. in the vicinity of Middlebelt Road and Five Mile Road.

THE PAIR had gained entry into the Mocar plant by breaking out a panel of glass in the overhead door and reaching inside to open the lock. The pair were apparently after a cyclone cutting torch equipment and oxygen tank which police found in front of the rear door. Officer Harding's arrival on the scene apparently caught the pair as they were about to remove the tools. Detective Sgt. William Garden, upon questioning the Agar brothers, was able to claim numerous other burglaries in the area which have occurred recently.
