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city can provide water at rates cheaper than the township would be able to because the city has a reservoir capacity which the township doesn't, he added.

Dinan stated that from his initial review of assessments and township taxes being paid by homeowners in the area presently it appeared that most would be paying less than \$30 more in taxes yearly if they came into the city. Some pay this much a year now for garbage and rubbish pickup services from a private contractor, he commented.

ALL AGREED that before the annexation question is put to a vote a clear plan on how developed should be presented as well as exact figures on what assessments on individuals, parcels of property would be and what taxes would be. Exact costs to individual property owners for water and sewer services were also asked to be established.

The city manager assured the planners that he was already at work getting this information together.

The status of the planners was that all the facts should be gathered and presented clearly and then the voters left to decide.
