assessment formula is not based upon benefits but upon cost.

3. That the assessment is levied against our clients property without due process of law because the improvement affords no substantial benefit to their property and because the assessment levy far exceeds the value of incidental benefit that could possibly be realized in the future.

City Attorney Robert Kelly's only comment on the letter of intent was that the city had no benefits received by property followed the provisions of the city charter carefully.

1. That the assessment district does not include all properties benefiting by the proposed improvement and therefore is illegal.

2. That the assessment formula is arbitrary and that it does not properly measure the benefits received by property followed the provisions of the city charter carefully.

Robert Kopp, manager of Dan Lowe's Hardware in Farmington is spending two weeks with the National Guard at Camp Grayling, Michigan.

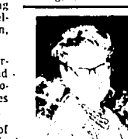

Kelly, a representative of the development company owning most of this land, stated that he questioned highly whether the type of improvement proposed by the county would hold up very long. He doubted that present drainage problems could be solved by the county in the manner they proposed.

Kelly also said that he did not feel that the blacktopping would hold up very long and that he favored a more lasting improvement if a any improvements at all were going to be made.

It was explained during discussion that putting in concrete paving would be very expensive.

THE MATTER was referred back to the city manager for more study. Councilmen indicated that they would be willing to consider standing a half if the property owners would be willing to stand the other half for the improvement. If the county's cost estimate is correct, the city-at-large cost would run about \$3,200.

In addition to exploring the methods of underwriting the cost in more detail, the councilmen also instructed the city manager to meet with road commission officials again to discuss the drainage problem more thoroughly. Like Kelly, some councilmen expressed concern as to whether blacktopping would hold up due to the heavy usage this stretch of roadway gets.
