Farmington may have a potential Olympic contender in 18-year-old Gail Peterson of 24845 Creekside.

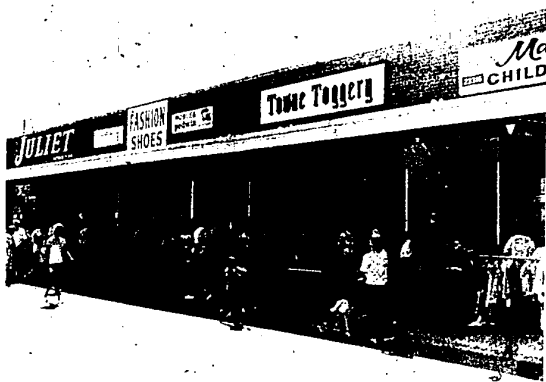
Gail, who has been active in AAU girls' track events for several years, took first place in the 880 meter event July 10 in the Women's Ulica Open and carried off a second place ribbon in the 1500 meter.

The Farmington High School senior was competing against more than 50 outstanding women athletes from southeastern Michigan.

Gail, considered the second fastest girl runner in the state

(Frances Kracker, 18, of Ann Arbor leads), had bids from both East Lansing and the University of Michigan to run next year with their teams. She has decided to join the Michigan, coached by former Olympic champion Kenneth Simmons.

Because there has been no girls' track team in Farmington, Gail has been racing for about a year on her own. She contributes much of her success to the coaching she has received from star track coach Hayes Jones.



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
