# World Travelers Here Relate Their Experiences Abroad

Having recently completed a trip in which they circled the globe, by ship, plane, ricksha and camel, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Austin of Nice, California, formerly from this area, are spending the summer months with their daughters, Mrs. Fred Wark of Clements Circle, Livonia and Mrs. Russell Cleveland of Rocky Crest Drive, Farmington, and their families. They called from San Francisco on March 2 on the S.S. Iberia and were met and entertained in Honolulu by Bob and Mary Jane Kinley, whose families live in Farmington.

On their voyage the Austins discovered that beautiful, modern Tokyo has subways and monorails and television but is totally lacking a sewage system. They found goldfish in a Japanese Garden that liked to have their heads scratched. It seems impossible that 100,000 people are born on junks and sampans in Hong Kong Harbor, live their entire lives on them, and die without ever standing on land.

The Australians, whose winter was just starting in June, emphasized that they are America's best friends, and will continue to be as long as we don't try to dominate them.

IN CEYLON, the Austins were entertained by Kande dancers in elegant costumes, and snake charmers, and crocodiles and huge crabs. Laundry was done in Bombay, India for 30 rupees a month, by natives using little soap and beating the garments on rocks until clean. Conditions in Bombay are indescribably pitiful as some parents defend their infants so they will become better beggars when they are on their own, at about seven years. Some families pay the government seven to ten rupees a month to rent living space on the sidewalk. One native had rented the space under the traffic light controlling the intersection of five streets, for his bed.

On docking at the Arab town of Aden, between the Indian Ocean and the Red Sea, the passengers of the Iberia were protected by policemen and machine guns and were

warned that the ship couldn't wait for anyone who was detained in unfriendly hands. A dazzling sight in Egypt was King Tut's tomb which contains six solid gold coffins, gold furniture, his chariot and many other things, including chickens, sheep, rum, seals, and a chess game which were buried with him, all weighing 350 million pounds. The Austins also were impressed by the nine Pyramids and the Sphinx, which they visited on camelback.

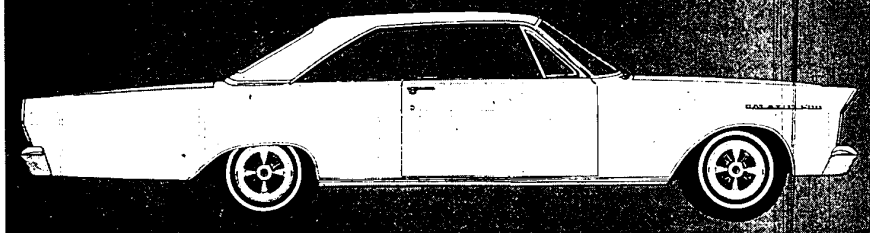
THEY FOUND that the Rock of Gibraltar, nearly three miles long with a population of 27,000, contains a huge cave that was used as a hospital during the war but is now an auditorium for concerts, etc. After taking two cable cars to reach the summit of Mt. Pilatus in Switzerland, and visiting the Brenner Pass in Austria's Tyrol Mountains, the Austins feared that our majestic California Rockies might look small. In Italy they thrilled to Michelangelo's sculpturing and the Vatican galleries. They also saw the live, well-cared-for she-wolf, said to be a direct descendant of the one that reared Romulus and Remus.

The Austins completed their trip, arriving in Michigan just in time to see their 19-year-old grandson, Rocky Cleveland, off on a Pan American flight to Belgium where he will spend the summer working in Brussels' fabulous new Westbury Hotel. (Rocky recently wrote that he had bought a Fiat 86 and has visited the family of Mikki Duym, Farmington's 1962 foreign exchange student. One problem Rocky has is looking enough like King Leopold to be his twin. American travelers in Europe are overjoyed to find someone there who speaks their own language. Rocky will return home in time to start his third year at Michigan State University.)

The Austins' grandchildren, and their parents, were thrilled over the exciting packages reaching their homes from all corners of the world. They feel that receiving the gifts, pictures and letters is nearly as good as traveling.

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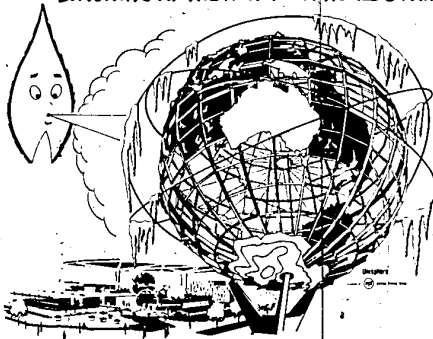
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
