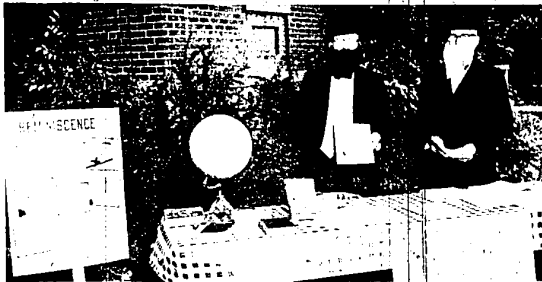

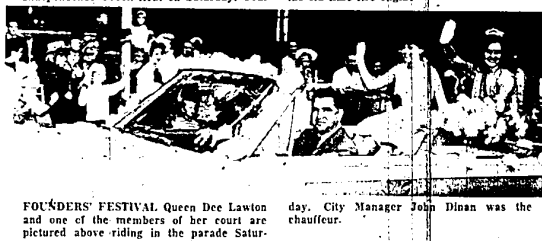
MASONS OF FARMINGTON Masonic Lodge No. 151, F. and A. M. are pictured above at the booth in Saturday's Country Fair which

Duke (left) and Norm Lawton (right) drove the old time fire engine.



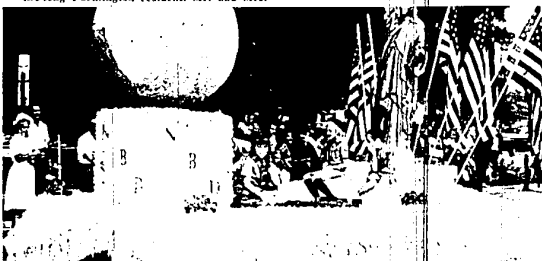
