A MOTORCADE of convicts provided transportation for the ten finalists from Bedford Inn to the steps of the Farmington City Hall where the beauty pageant winner and her two runners-up were announced by Farmington Board of Commerce President Bill Conroy.

City Manager John Dinan and his wife, who served as official hosts for Miss Founders' Festival, crowned Miss Lawton as her court, June 31, 1965. Some of the highlights of that day included a radio interview with Don Perry over Radio Station WJW in Detroit. Stores in the Downtown Farmington Center and the Farmington Shopping Plaza were all

visited by the queen as well as the other finalists. The Battle of the Bands staged at the Knights of Columbus Hall, MISS LAWTON and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Lawton, were the guests of City officials Friday night for a dinner at Farmington's Danish Inn. Popular entertainer Pat Flowers introduced the queen and dedicated a number to her. After dinner, the group attended the Musicals staged at the Farmington Junior High School.

The final day of the Founders' Festival, Saturday, July 31, started for the queen with an early morning appointment at the Farmington studio of photographer Ralph Evert who took pictures of the queen with her crown and flowers. A continental breakfast at Bedford Inn was followed by the parade which was again climaxed by ceremonies at the City Hall.

The queen was again interviewed on radio, this time by a WEBR remote hookup on the grounds of the Country Fair Saturday afternoon. The Jaycee Chicken-Barbecue, a summer band concert in the City Park and the viewing of two baseball games concluded Saturday's Founders' Festival highlights and an eventful week for Miss Lawton.

Allen Seeks Streamlined City Agenda

A study of possible revisions that might be made in the city's present official meeting agenda to "streamline it" was suggested by Councilman John Allen at the regular Council meeting Monday night.

It was his feeling that important matters were often brought up by councilmen and citizens in the audience under the "miscellaneous" category at the conclusion of the agenda that citizens had no knowledge were going to be brought up and that even some councilmen were not aware would be up for discussion.

IT WAS explained to Councilman Allen that the agenda was developed in such a manner that items important enough to be listed individually did come first. Written letters of request from individuals or groups wishing to be heard should be filed with the city manager's office by Friday to be placed on the agenda. Councilmen having items they wish to be placed on the agenda need only to let the city manager know prior to Monday morning, he was informed.

The agenda is posted all day Monday at the City Hall and anyone wishing to know what is on the agenda can review it anytime during the day, the city manager explained.

Allen also felt that many routine requests for the use of city facilities or to conduct driver in the city might automatically be approved by the city manager without coming up for official Council approval if a definite policy was established.

CITY MANAGER Dinan did not agree with Allen on this point. His feeling was that requests of this kind were an administrative function and should come before the Council. Other councilmen agreed with the city manager on this point.

At the conclusion of the discussion it was agreed to have the city manager make a study of agendas used by other municipalities to determine whether any further "streamlining" might be possible.

Councilman Howard Thayer stated that he was very well pleased with the type of agenda Dinan had developed and termed it a vast improvement over what the city had under previous administrators. He and Wilbur Brotherton also spoke highly of the present agenda.

Farmington's descendants, 100 years hence, will find a wealth of information about past and present Farmington waiting for them when the opening moment arrives.

Other items added to the capsule were a current financial statement of the Metropolitan National Bank and two of the commemorative Festivals, Michigan and the National Bank of Detroit, a list of contributors for the Farmington Historical Society and a copy of Rev. E. Markham's dedicatory prayer.

Books and pamphlets stored for posterity were a copy of Farmington's history, a copy of a brochure on Farmington prepared by the Board of Commerce, a Farmington telephone book, a Centennial Lodge book issued this year by the Masonic lodge of Farmington, and a copy of the "Know Your Oakland County Government" booklet, and "Farmington a booklet of women voters early this year."
