## Physical Exam Dates Nearing For Athletes

As the dates for physical examinations draw near for area athletes, John K. Cotton, Director of Physical Education and Athletics for the Farmington Public Schools, issues the reminder that all boys reporting on August 25 or 26 should have with them medical history forms.

The medical history forms are available at public schools, the Farmington School District Administration Building and at Our Lady of Sorrows High School.

PARENTS ARE to fill out the information asked for on the medical history form, sign it, and make sure it accompanies the boy when he reports for his physical examination.

Physicians are required for all boys planning to participate in athletics either at their school or in the Farmington Junior Football program.

Senior high boys will report for physical examinations at Farmington High School at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, August 25. Junior high boys will report the same day at 10 a.m. and junior football hopefuls at 11 a.m. The same schedule will be in effect for physicals slated at North Farmington High School on Thursday morning, August 26.

All athletes attending area schools, public or parochial, are included in the annual physical examination program which costs \$1 for each boy and is administered by a registered nurse. Additional information may be obtained by contacting Mr. Cotton's office at GR. 4-5327.

## N. Farmington Colt All-Stars Defeated

North Farmington was knocked from the state tournament in boys' "Colt" baseball when their all-star team lost to St. Clair Shores for the second time in as many days. An interim win July 26 over Southgate, knocking them out of the tournament, gave North Farmington some hope but unfortunately it was brief.

After being rained out Saturday evening, the team returned Sunday to lose a 5-1 effort to the host city. The Shores team brought their hitting log as they pummeled Farmington's Dan Litchman for 11 hits, including a first inning double followed by a home run over the left field fence by catcher Zberok.

ALLAN KILKKA's double and singles by Litchman, Bob Johnson, Steve Sager, and Steve Madigan was all the hitting the losers could muster. Aided by five walks issued by three Shores hurlers, North Farmington had a threat going almost every inning but the clutch hitting just didn't materialize.

Facing elimination against Southgate, North Farmington found needed strength in the strong right arm of Fritz Simmons. Fritz scattered six singles and except for a passed ball and a pair of errors, would have had a shutout. He did not walk a man and only two putouts were made by out fielders. Meanwhile, his teammates were capitalizing on 3 for 3 performances by Steve Sager and Al Kikka combined with four Southgate errors. N. Farmington won 5-3.

NORTH FARMINGTON again faced St. Clair Shores after the Shores had lost a close 3-2 de-

cision to Hamtramck the previous evening. This time the Shores threw a big range left-hander named Mike Madison. He proved to be too much for the losers' hitters as he limited them to singles by Sager, Simmons, and Madigan. The game started out as a pitchers' battle as Farmington's Bill Harris retired the first ten batters in order. At that point, he seemed to lose the range, however, as he was combed for five successive hits and three runs.

Reliever Dick Butters came on to relieve the side without further damage and limit them to only two additional hits for the remainder of the game. Both came in the final inning, however, and combined with two errors, gave the Shores three more runs.

Farmington gave a last gasp in the final inning with three runs on a pair of singles, two walks, and two errors, but St. Clair Shores won 6-3 and advanced to the finals (Hamtramck won the tournament with a 2-0 victory).

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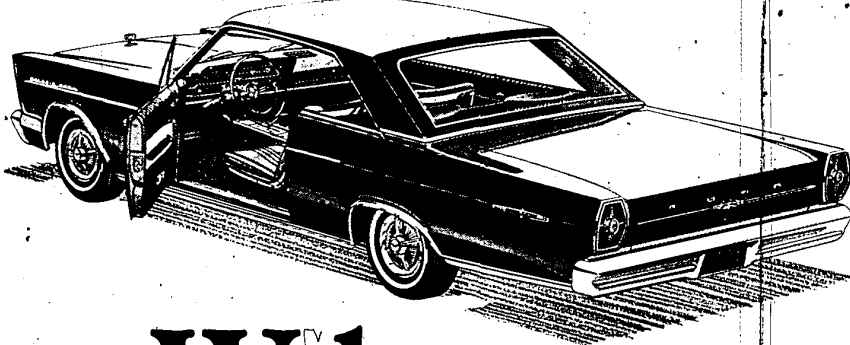
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
