

Hayes Resigns, Tyler New Football Coach at FHS

In a somewhat unexpected development last week, Jack Hayes resigned as head football coach at Farmington High School to teach physical education and coach at Jackson Community College.

Assistant football coach Richard Tyler has been named interim head coach to replace Hayes.

Tyler, 30, has been Hayes' assistant here for the past six years.

A 1953 graduate of Farmington High, Tyler played football and captained the basketball team during his high school athletic career.

Tyler attended Heidelberg College for two years and then transferred to Eastern Michigan University, earning his BA degree with a history major in 1957 and his MA in School Administration in 1961.

IN ADDITION to his interim football coaching work, Tyler will continue with his present administrative duties as direc-

tor of adult education and summer school for the district and as Farmington High School attendance counselor and audiovisual director.

Married and the father of three children, Tyler lives at 32007 Valleyview, Farmington.

Coach Hayes came to Farmington as head football coach in 1953 from Salem where he had coached for two years and in his first year there his team compiled a record of three victories and five losses. He mold-

ed a good nucleus for a better team the following year and in 1957 his team compiled a record of five wins against two losses and a tie, going down to the final quarter against Southfield for the championship in the league before losing out.

HAYES' 1958 team was the best he ever fielded. That year the FHS grid team compiled a perfect 8-0 record and was rated seventh among Class A teams in the entire state. Guard Jack Lawing was named All-

State guard that year.

The 1959 FHS team posted five more victories to the 1958 record before losing a close one to Pontiac. The team ended that season with a record of 6-2.

Both the 1960 and '61 seasons were bad years with the FHS team being unvictorious in '60 and posting only one win in 1961.

Hayes' team had a record of four victories and four losses along with one tie in 1962 and a 2-5-1 record in 1963. Last year's team posted a record of five wins against three losses and one tie.

IN ADDITION to coaching football, Hayes also coached the golf team from 1958 through 1962 with his teams winning three regionals and placing second in another. In 1962 the team won the league and regional titles and placed fourth in the state meet.

Jackson Community College in Jackson, Michigan, has an enrollment of approximately 2,000 students. In addition, physical education instruction, Hayes indicated that he will serve as assistant basketball coach and also coach of spring sport which will very likely be baseball.

FARC Winds Up Summer Program

The Farmington Area Recreation Commission ended its summer program with a trip to Bob-Lo Island on August 6. All in all, 341 youngsters from both the Farmington and Clawsonville areas participated in the outing.

A total of 11,905 young boys and girls from the combined two areas participated in the

Commission's six-week program. The activities of the program included: swimming, crafts and athletic activities at various playground sites, two trips to the Zoo, two visits to Tiger Stadium, a Field Day at City Park, and the trip to Bob-Lo Island.

The above figure is 216 more than the number that attended the Commission's program last year. Total registration, however, dropped downward from 1,769 to 1,538.

THE ENTIRE program was made available to the youth of the community, free of charge, because of generous contributions received from local governmental and social organizations. The bulk of the money received was donated by the Farmington Township, City of Farmington, and the Farmington Board of Education.

Generous contributions were also presented to the Commission by: the United Fund, Farmington Jay Cees, Beechview PTA, Shawasssee PTA, Town Club, and several anonymous residents of the community.

The Commission hopes to again make available to the youth of the Farmington area a winter recreation program with the monies left after all the bills of the Commission have been paid. This program will begin sometime in the latter part of January and be approximately six weeks long.

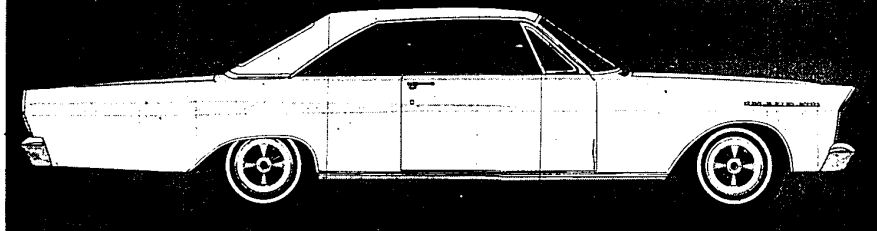
