## OK Plans for Subdivision

The Township Board gave its official approval to the preliminary plot plan for the Churchill Estates Subdivision planned on an 80 acre parcel at the southwest corner of 11 Mile and Inkster Road at its regular meeting Monday night.

The 166 homestead development will have minimum 90 foot frontage lots and an average of 2.07 lots per acre. Prior to taking official action, Township Board members reminded the developers that

they will be required to provide turning lanes at all entrances to the subdivision from both 11 Mile and Inkster Road. Another requirement will be that the developers blackout or provide a sidewalk in the easement from the subdivision to the school site.

The preliminary plans were reviewed in detail earlier by the township's planners and planning consultants and approved.
