The 1965 bowling season was officially under way with the annual Youth Bowling Association banquet Sunday, August 22. Over 500 youngsters from all sections of Michigan were at the Latin Quarter in Detroit to receive awards for state and national tournaments held during the last year.

Twenty-six boys and girls from Farmington Lanes were there to receive their trophies.

KEVIN ANDERSON was also honored as Michigan Junior Girls Singles champion and Diane Carruthers both as Major Girls Singles Champion and for her seventh place finish in the National Singles. The junior program at Farmington Lanes was the second largest in the state last year.

This year's program will get under way on Saturday, Sept. 18.

The purpose of the leagues is to give the youngsters the opportunity to learn bowling under supervised conditions. The practice they receive during league play helps to develop proper bowling form. Bowling has become more popular with the youngsters each year and it is one of the few sports which they will be able to participate in as adults.

HIGHLIGHTS OF the program include reduced bowling rates several tournaments during the season and, included without cost are, free bowling shirts, season-end banquet and trophies. Bowling is \$1.25 per week, rental of shoes is 10 cents and there is a \$1 registration fee to join the Youth Bowling Association. Special instruction is given beginners and bowling balls as light as 8 pounds are available.

Saturday leagues are: 9 a.m. - Beginning boys and girls (7 to 13); 12:15 Boys and girls under 13 with 90 or better average; 12:15 Junior High boys and girls mixed; 3 p.m. Boys and girls under 13 with previous bowling experience; on Sundays at 12:30 the High School boys and girls will bowl in a mixed league. During the first two weeks of the High School league special instruction will be given to beginners.

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
