

Plan to Field Six L. L. Football Teams

Junior Football Association officials, President Bob Dwyer and Head Coach Bill Renne, announced at the meeting of the Dads Club on Wednesday evening that three Farmington teams would be entered in the new Western Suburban Junior Football League.

The idea behind the move was to get more 9 and 10 year old boys, who do not weigh more than 120 pounds, to play organized football. The officials made an appeal to the Dads to interest at least 220 boys who are needed for the six teams in both the old and the new league, and hope to get younger boys to fill out the rosters on the new teams.

To be eligible, a boy must

register, bring his birth certificate, and have a doctor's physical examination before the registration deadline of September 10.

PRACTICE sessions are being held on week days from 4:30 to 6 p.m. with the exception of Saturday until school starts. After school starts, the practice sessions will be held Monday through Thursday from 10 until 15 minutes before sundown.

Head Coach Renne made an urgent plea for more coaches because the six teams will have approximately 35 boys each, and three coaches will be needed for each team.

The new Western Suburban League will be playing Sunday

games; however, the teams in the Jack Lowther League will still be playing their games on Saturday at various fields in the nearby suburbs starting September 11.

The Dads were told that more money would be needed and the estimated operating budget for the six Farmington Teams was set at \$5,000.

President Bob Dwyer suggested that the Dads appeal to all those interested in supporting the program and that a good portion of the revenue could be raised from ads placed in the Junior Football Program booklet by those interested sponsors and the Farmington city businessmen who have supported the program

COACH TYLER and his staff of Doug Race, Uwe Weiss, Clarence Haus and Jack Lawing will be looking for talent this week to support the five seasoned backfield men and nine linemen returning from the 1964 squad.

This week's drills will taper off to a single workout on Saturday and the traditional Labor Day intra-squad scrimmage at 9 a.m. on Monday, September 6.

Leading the returning veterans for head coach Ron Holland is All-Conference quarterback, Bill Oldershaw. Craig Wycinski, a hard-running fullback, joins Oldershaw as Holland's only varsity-tested backfield men.

COUNTING HEAVILY on talent from the 1964 team which last year compiled a fine 6-1 record on the season, coach Holland has a total of 70 gridders working out this week.

The Raider linemen have been working out since Monday in drills from 7 a.m. until 9 p.m. this morning. Backfield candidates have had the field from 9:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. Coach Holland has been holding afternoon sessions with both groups from 3:30 p.m. until 5 p.m. This schedule will hold through Saturday with Sunday being a day of rest and a single morning practice set for Labor Day, 9 a.m. until 10 a.m.

COACH HOLLAND has two newcomers to his staff this year in Dennis Fitzgerald and Ken Kaestner. John Herrington is back again in charge of the reserve squad with Ken Dean and Tom Wallis returning.
