Two courses being offered are open without charge to the public. The course being offered for the first time, Small Boat Handling, will be taught by Mr. T. Nebbett on Wednesday nights beginning September 22.

The small boat handling course is sponsored by the U.S. Power Squadron to help build skills in piloting, seamanship and small boat handling. The course includes a basic knowledge of rules and regulations, navigation, safety, considerations and customs in boating.

THE OTHER COURSE being offered without charge, Introduction to Football, will be taught by John K. Cotton, Director of Physical Education and Athletics for the Farmington Public Schools who is also a member of the Executive Committee of the Michigan High School Athletic Association. Held for Rape Of 16-Year-Old Detroit Girl

Farmington Township Police officers arrested 30-year-old Donald L. Riggs of 15900 Maxwell Street in Plymouth on August 25 and charged him with the rape in Farmington Township August 24 of a 16-year-old Detroit girl.

Farmington Township Police Detective Russell Conway and Township Police who was arrested at Riggs in Plymouth and he stood mute at his arraignment before Justice of the Peace Emory Hicks. Riggs is being held in the Oakland County Jail on a bond set at \$20,000.

The 16-year-old girl told Township Police she was attacked at knife point shortly after she and a girl friend accepted a ride in Riggs' car. The other girl escaped after Riggs stopped the car in the Nine Mile Road-Halsted Road area of the Township where the alleged attack took place at about 10 a.m. on August 24.

Top Speaker For Marker Unveiling Set

The unveiling of the historical marker designating Farmington as the first Quaker settlement in Michigan which is scheduled for Saturday afternoon, September 11, at 2 p.m. on the grounds in front of the Farmington City Hall will feature a main address from Dr. P. Clever Bald, Professor of History at the University of Michigan and Director of the Michigan Historical Collections.

Dr. Bald is also the noted author of the book, "Michigan in Four Centuries." He is considered a specialist in Michigan and midwest history and is well known in the field.

ALSO SCHEDULED to be present for the unveiling ceremonies Sept. 11 are many of the descendants of Arthur Powell, the first Farmington settler. Members of historical societies throughout the state and representatives from the State Historical Commission are also expected to be in attendance.

The combined bands of Farmington and North Farmington High Schools will be present for the ceremonies and residents of the community are urged to turn out in mass to witness the unveiling.

The molesting occurred in a wooded area near Nine Mile Road and Grand River Avenue about 3:30 p.m. on Monday.

The man was arrested at his Detroit home by Detective Donald Youles and Sgt. Robert Deadman of the Farmington City Police Department. He was arraigned before Municipal Judge Sylvester J. Pheneby on Tuesday morning, August 31, and is being held in lieu of bond set at \$7,500.

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the high school. Thirty-two teachers will be employed in the system.

St. Paul's Lutheran School reports a total of 160 pupils expected to attend kindergarten through eighth grade, which is only 10 more than the report for last year.

ST. FABIAN'S school will hold classes this year for grades one, two and three with an anticipated enrollment of about 175. There will be two classes of first graders, two classes for second graders and one class for third graders. Four Bernardine Sisters and a lay teacher will make up the teaching staff.

The new Mercy High School at 11 Mile and Middlebelt Roads will open for classes this fall, but no enrollment figures are available at this time. The opening of this school, as well as St. Fabian's, probably accounts for the slight drop in enrollment in Our Lady of Sorrows schools.

OCC Gets Added NDEA Loan Funds

The Oakland Community College National Defense Student Loan Fund now totals \$144,000 with the receipt of an additional sum of \$116,288 from the U.S. Office of Education, James W. Hobson, OCC Vice-President for Business, announced this week. This program was established under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act and enables needy students to borrow funds for tuition and related college expenses at extremely low interest rates.

The College has also received Capital Outlay Matching Funds in the amount of \$205,272 from the Michigan Department of Public Instruction (DPI). This segment of State Aid is provided for construction purposes, Hobson disclosed.
