Local Exchange Student Tells of Summer in Sweden

 After a summer spent in Sweden under the auspices of the Youth for Understanding Teen-Age Exchange Program, Rick North is enthusiastic about the Scandinavian way of life and has a much richer understanding of a culture different from his own. Rick is the son of Lee and Isabel North and lives at 26418 Quaker Lane in Old Homestead. Most of Rick's stay was at Halsingborg on the seashore where his Swedish family had their summer residence, but he accompanied them back to their winter home at Vimmerly in the state of Smaland when they returned in time for the children to begin school on August 25. His travels took him on a five-day bike trip through Denmark; most of the time on this trip, however, it rained and since each boy carried about fifty pounds of camping gear on his bike, only about thirty-five miles a day were covered. One day they had four flat tires, and at first Rick was a bit discouraged; so actually this trip is more fun in retrospect than it was in reality. There will undoubtedly be ways and a very damp spot in Rick's heart for Denmark. RICK ARRIVED in Sweden in time to observe the Midsummer Festival which celebrates the sun and the long days of midsummer. The Swedes almost worship the sun, possibly because they see so little of it. This summer was the best sunny in 100 years, and the seabathing was extremely chilly with the water remaining at about fifty-five degrees. The young people did swim almost daily in spite of that, so Rick probably acquired some Viking blood. For the first two weeks of his stay, Rick lived with a family named Jacobsson while his adopted parents, the Tegners, were redecorating their summer home. When he moved in with his more permanent father was a physician who, together with one other doctor, ran a small hospital. There were four children, Roland 19, Anders 17, Sven 14, and Jessica 9. Having brothers was a new experience, as in Rick's Farmington family there are only two sisters Barbara and Nancy. ALL OF THE Tegners are wonderful skiers, and traveled to Norway last winter for a holiday week of skiing. They introduced Rick to ocean canoeing, which sounds like a dangerous sport; he blew out to sea in about fifteen minutes, but it took an hour to paddle back. He caught an enormous cold, and his activity was potato picking; and after a few days of that, Rick thought he'd never stand up straight again. Teen-agers in Sweden are very much like those at home, but there seems to be very little juvenile delinquency and the young people are treated
