Falcons Lack Punch for TDs., Bow to Bentley 20-6

Bentley High School utilized powerful running and clutch passing to smother the Falcon football team Friday afternoon by a score of 20-6.

Bentley scored twice in the first half, and once more in the third quarter while keeping Farmington at bay until the last half minute of play. Both teams fumbled frequently.

FARMINGTON was unable to contain the Bulldog rushing attack, led by fullback Bob Elsner. Elsner, though suffering a leg injury in the fourth quarter, compiled a total of 109 yards rushing in only 11 carries during the encounter.

With the thermometer hanging in the middle 80's, Bentley kicked off to start the game. Immediately the Falcons launched a drive which carried them to within 30 yards of the Bentley end zone. But the Farmington engine stalled at that point, and neither team could get started until later in the quarter.

Following an intercepted pass—with just a minute and 50 seconds remaining in the quarter, Bentley halfback Jim Matveva romped 28 yards for the first touchdown of the game. The kick was good, and at the quarter's end Bentley still led by seven solid points.

Falcon Wayne Johnston punted from the Farmington 35 yard line to begin the second quarter. After one pass to each team, Bentley quarterback Greg Coleman arched a 61 yard touchdown pass to end Ken Bauman.

On the kickoff, end Jerry Tinkle returned the ball 25 yards to the Falcon 40 yard line. From that point onward until halftime, both teams were unable to break the other's defense, and the score as the band began to play, read Bentley 14, Farmington 6.

FARMINGTON'S kickoff was returned by Bentley to their own 34, when play had resumed—but they were again bottled up by the Falcon defense. Four plays later, the Bulldogs punted and then recovered Farmington's fumble of the kick on the 32 yard line.

Bentley pushed to the 15 for another, first down and seemed on the verge of another touchdown. But they fumbled on the next two plays while the Falcons, recovering the second miscue.

Again, with the aid of a personal foul penalty, Falcon quarterback Mike Wilson passed his team to the 30 yard line of Bentley. There, however, the drive stopped. On a second down play Bentley safety Woods intercepted Wilson's intended pass for Cleveland. He was instantaneously tackled on the Bentley 27 by Fritz Simons.

Woods then put on his own running show, gaining two consecutive first downs with dashes of 12 and 15 yards, and brought the ball into Farmington territory.

Rocket Eleven Triumphs Over Dearborn, 48-0

On a hot, sweltering Saturday afternoon the Farmington Rockets ran, passed and scored at will over the newly formed and inexperienced Dearborn Mustangs.

After the opening kickoff it was quickly evident that the Mustangs were no match for the Rockets as Dan Steinke plunged through a gaping hole in the line and raced 32 yards for the first touchdown of the day. The extra point was good and the Rockets were out in front 7 to 0. The defense held after the Rockets kicked off.

MIKE GOW, mixing his plays well, stepped back with all the poise of a veteran and lifted the ball down the middle where Farmington's Rick Herpich leaped in the air to make a beautiful catch and raced in the end zone for the second touchdown. The play covered 45 yards.

In the second quarter, the same combination (Gow to Herpich) clicked again for the third touchdown. The score at halftime was 21 to 0 in favor of the Rockets.

At the start of the 3rd quarter, Coach Rene started to change various combinations on both offense and defense and with Gow passing to both Drew Mahale and Rick Herpich it wasn't long before the Rockets scored again.

CHAG DIBUE, who replaced Mike Gow at quarter back, scored the sixth touchdown, and shortly before the end of the game Herpich scored the last touchdown on a beautiful reverse with all the orange shirts leading the way.

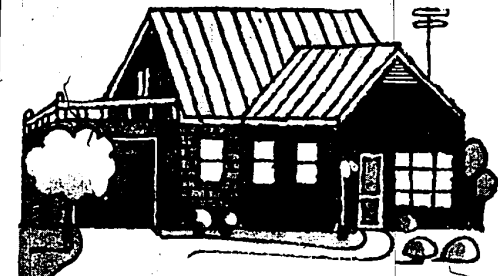
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OLS Gridders Bow in Opener

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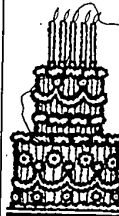
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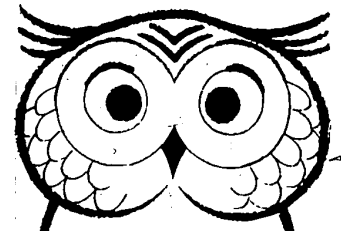


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
