Medical Missionaries To Speak At First Presbyterian Church

Speaking at the First Presbyterian Church of Farmington, Sunday September 26, 1965, will be Dr. Bruce Huntwork and his wife Billie, relating their experiences as medical missionaries in Iran, at 9:30 and 11 a.m. services.

The Farmington church is involved in missionary work under the program of relatedness set up by the Council of Ecumenical Missions and Relations of the United Presby-

terian Church in the U.S.A. The couple spent a full five year term, 1958-1963, at the Christian Hospital in Meshed, Iran. Dr. Huntwork was on the surgical staff and his wife assisted in a school of nursing nearby.

DR. HUNTWORK became interested in the missions work in Iran after hearing a speech by Dr. Sam Zwemer, the man responsible for opening up the missions program in that country. After his decision to make this his life's work, Dr. Huntwork had six months of orientation and preparation.

In that predominantly rural country, Dr. Huntwork notes that many changes are taking place. Medicine has taken many strides forward. Malaria is no longer threatens vast numbers of the population. Tuberculosis and hookworm, however, still are being fought, he adds.

"EDUCATION TOO has leaped ahead, in the past ten years especially," Dr. Huntwork states. But the Iranian government is now facing a new problem due to the rising numbers of students. That problem, he explains, is to find jobs for the many educated but unemployed young people in the country.

New irrigation projects are offering hope, he points out, of more diversified agriculture.

A native of Michigan, Dr. Huntwork was raised near Pontiac. He and his wife both attended the University of California for their undergraduate studies. She then spent three years as a missionary in the Philippines working with the Christian Student Movement. Upon her return to the United States, Mrs. Huntwork studied one year at the Union Theological Seminary.

HE, MEANWHILE was studying at the medical school of George Washington University in Washington, D.C. He

took his internship in Sayre, Penn. Dr. Huntwork, his wife and three young daughters are now living across from Ford Hospital where he is in his third year of surgical residency. After one more year of study here he and his family plan to return to Iran for another five year term of medical missions work.

Area Church Celebrates Christmas

The presents prepared by the ladies of the Chapel will be on display at the Missionary Christmas.

Southfield Chapel is located at 28600 Lahser Road, just south of 12 Mile Road. Rev. Badon H. Brown is pastor.
