Two Township Roadways That Need Widening

At the present time Farmington Township has only a couple of really good major artery north-south roadways and both are bottleneck two lane roads at least some of the distance that they run through the community.

We are referring to Middlebelt Road and Orchard Lake Road and both are long overdue in being widened the entire distance they extend through the township into at least three-lanes and preferably four-lanes. The more growth and development there is in the township the more serious the traffic flow problem becomes.

Some might say that Farmington Road should also be considered as a major north-south route through the township but we can't agree. A serious bottleneck situation prevails at Ten Mile and on southward through the city at least until Nine Mile and even beyond. Through traffic thus avoids this roadway.

way. With only Middlebelt and Orchard With only Middlebett and Orchard Lake roads to serve an ever increasing density of both commercial and residential development not only in Farmington but in communities north of 14 Mile Road as well, it is our opinion that the time to get these roads widened and made into good routes for thru traffic

is here now.

The Township Board is planning on giving more thorough study to strength-

ening its regulations to require turning lanes along the routes of these two roads and others, and we feel it's a very good move. But, these turning or deceleration lanes at the entrance-ways to new subdivisions, commercial business centers and schools will not be enough in themselves. The mider roadways are needed also.

Perhaps traffic counts that have been made don't show a definite need for these wider roadways yet. But, we have always argued and will continue to argue, that traffic counts in themselves are not the only criteria that should be used to determine when wider and safer roadways are needed.

Those of us who have to travel Orchard Lake and Middlebelt roads frequently know quite well that many trafic congestion and safety problems prevail and that the condition is getting constantly worse.

With development continuing to come

With development continuing to come more rapidly, it seems rather pointless to us to delay much longer in getting the wheels in motion to get both of these roadways widened soon.

If there are such widening plans in the works now, then we would like to see the county road commission make these plans known to the citizenry of Farmington and divulge their time-table schedule on the projects.

Treat All Re-zoning Requests Equally

A couple of weeks back we had praise for The Farmington Township Planning Commission for its "go slow" approach on re-toning more and more land area for multiple housing developments.

Our opinion has not changed that careful consideration should be given to all requests so as not to re-zone too much land area for multiples and get more apartments than would be healthy for a community such as Farmington.

But the specific action that was taken by the planners at their August 28 meeting was to flatly deny one request for exoning for apartments and table two others. The one request that was denied at once rather than being tabled was for approximately 210 units to the south of a proposed shopping center on the south side of Grand River east of Drake Road.

The proponents questloned why and so do we. Being located to the rear of a proposed shopping center it would seem like a logical type of buffer development between the commercial center and single family homes. Furthermore, an inspection of the property by us as laymen would indicate that there

might be some serious problems in de-veloping this property so near to a planned commercial center with single family homes. The topography just doesn't seem to lend itself to a cheaper-type of single family home develop-ment

ment.

Again we want to emphasize that we favor a "go slow" approach on re-zoning too much land for multiple housing but feel that this proposed area for re-zoning for multiple units deserves more thorough and careful consideration than it was given. It should at least be given as much time and study as the other requests for re-zoning and it hasn't, in our opinion.

If the commercial zoning is to be allowed on that portion of the property that fronts onto Grand River, then there is added reason for considering multiple housing to the rear of the planned shopping center, we would think.

Our plea is that the planners continue to "go slow" on re-zoning but that they give all requests thorough, fair and equal study and consideration.
