

# Announce Semi finalists In Nat'l. Merit Tests

Names of over 14,000 Semi-finalists, seven from Farmington, in the 1965-66 competition for Merit Scholarships were announced today by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

The Semi-finalists are the highest-scoring students in each state on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, administered last March in over 17,600 schools nationwide.

Semi-finalists from Farmington High School are Sherry Dorow, Susan Innes and Kath Green Schacht; and from North Farmington High School, Robert Edall, Anne Hodge, Pili Morse and Richard North.

To become Finalists, the students must substantiate their qualifying test performance on a second examination, submit recommendations by their schools, and fulfill routine requirements. All Merit Scholars for 1966 will then be selected from the Finalist group.

"In honoring them," said John M. Stalaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, "we should remember that others have contributed significantly to their success by encouraging the characteristics which produce high achievement, including energy and hard work. The Semi-finalists bring honor not only to themselves, but also to their families, their teachers, and their communities."

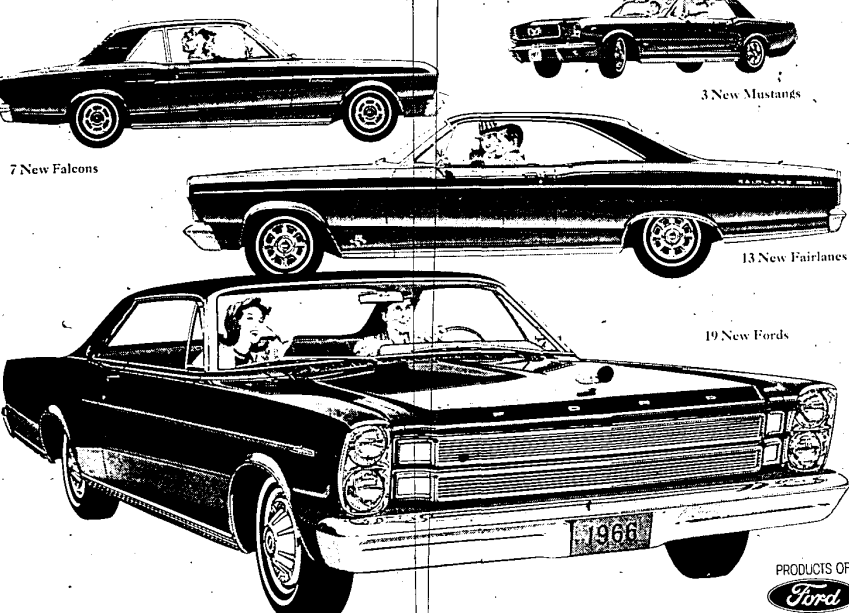

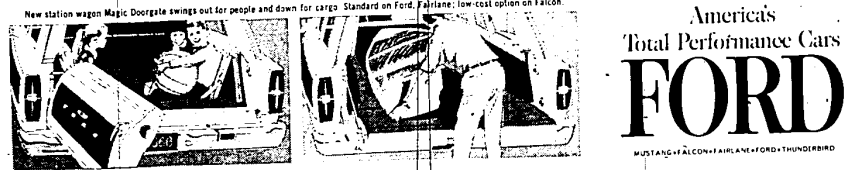

Up to 8:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time on Monday, October 4, 1965.

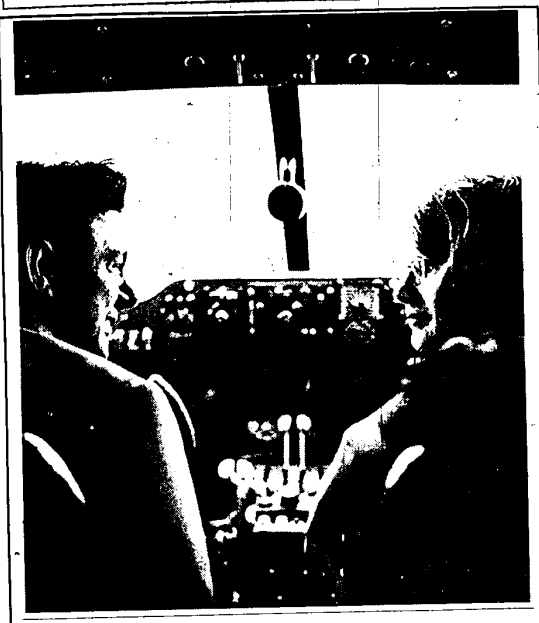
