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Democratic Club To Host St. Lawmakers

Leading spokesmen for the Democratic and Republican parties in the State Senate will give their views of the record of the 1965 Michigan Legislature at the 8 p.m. Wednesday, October 6, meeting of the Farmington Democratic Club.

The speakers will be Senators Sander Levin (D, Berkeley) and Farrell Roberts (R, Pontiac). The meeting will be held in the community room (entrance in the rear) of the City National Bank, Ten Mile at Orchard Lake, in Farmington. Levin, although a freshman, has risen to a position of leadership in the majority party through his work as chairman of the Labor Committee and his membership on the Education Committee.

SENATOR ROBERTS, a leader of the GOP Moderate bloc in previous service in the Senate, was returned to that body last spring in a special election held to fill the seat vacated by the death of Paul Chandler.

Farmington Democratic Club chairman Aldo Vaggonzi stressed that the meeting is open to the public.

Vaggonzi said that because of the bipartisan makeup of the speakers panel he has sent a special invitation to several Farmington Republican leaders to attend the meeting as guests of the Democrats.

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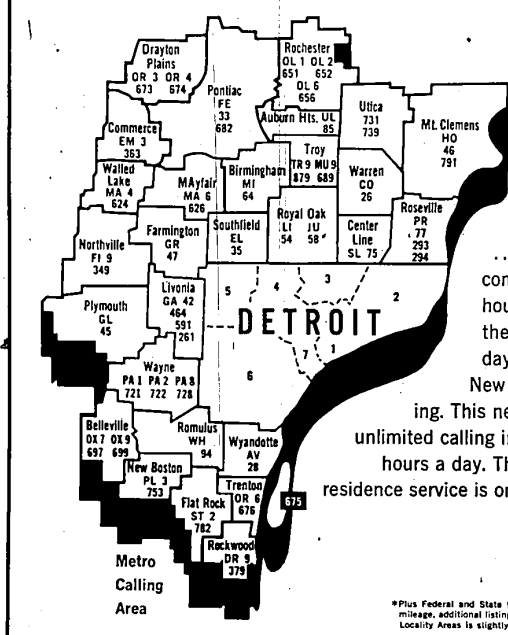
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
