

# B.C. Control On Soliciting Gets Members Approval

At a general membership meeting of the Farmington Board of Commerce last Tuesday evening, Sept. 28, a motion was passed establishing the B. of C. as a clearing house for all groups wishing to solicit from business places in the community.

Any group or organization wishing to solicit from industry, business or professional people will be requested to apply in written form to the Board of Commerce office well in advance of the time they wish to solicit for approval.

EACH BOARD of Commerce member in good standing will be provided with a plaque stating that solicitors are expected to be cleared through the B. of C. It will still be up to the individual B. of C. member to determine whether he wishes to give to a particular group but will afford the businessmen some protection against solicitors he has some question about. B. of C. President Bill Conroy stated.

Mrs. Stella Styrge gave a report on plans being made to place brackets and ornaments to be placed on utility poles for Christmas decorations. It was explained that this would make installation of decorations easier and that such pole decorations, approved by Detroit Edison, could be used for decorations and banners for other occasions during the year.

A L.S.O. DISCUSSED briefly were plans for the second annual Otis Yule Log benefit football game between Farmington High and North Farmington High to be held Nov. 13. Adult tickets will sell for \$1.50 with half the money going to the Board of Commerce Christmas decoration fund. Dick McPherson, National Bank of Detroit executive, and Ed Brotherton, manager of the Downtown Farmington Center, are co-chairmen for this event.

# Councilmen Table Highway Dept. Request

A request by the state highway department that the city participate in the cost of improving and modernizing the pedestrian crosswalk signals at the Farmington Road - Grand River intersection met with opposition at the regular City Council meeting Monday night.

Three of the five councilmen balked at spending \$544 of city money for this improvement and voted to table action on the request. Councilmen Howard Thayer, Hugo Peterson and John Allen voted against the expenditure while Councilman Ralph Yoder and Mayor Sandy Brotherton felt the city should go along with the state's request.

Thayer and Allen both commented that at least part of their decision for voting against cooperating with the state highway department on this request was prompted by the city's lack of cooperation in improving the installation of a traffic light on Grand River at Power Road.

# Twp. Woman Hurt In Fatal Crash

A Farmington Township woman is in serious condition this week following involvement in a two-car accident near Jonesville in Hillsdale County which claimed the life of a passenger in her car.

Injured fatally in the crash was Mrs. Winifred M. Campbell, 80, of 18264 Kentfield in Detroit. The driver of the car, Mrs. Iloa Speas, 71, of 30424 13 Ave. in Farmington Township, is in serious condition at Hillsdale Community Health Center in Hillsdale.

Mrs. Speas' car was struck head-on by a car driven by Gerald Cartmel, 52, of Horton who was also seriously injured.

(Continued from Page 1) violating the simple rules of safety can have tragic results. Some of the careless practices which cause fires in the home were outlined by Sgt. Harold Lewis. They include cigarette smoking when one is discarded carelessly to smolder in an over stuffed chair or mattress while a portable oil heater while it is operating overloading or over fusing electrical circuits and accumulating rubbish which is always a potential breeding place for fire. Neglecting to teach youngsters that matches and cigarette lighters are not playthings is also a much violated safety rule.

The meeting was concluded on a serious note regarding the apathy of present members to becoming involved in the B. of C. projects and attending meetings and the large number of business and professional people who are still not members of the Board of Commerce. A more vigorous effort to get present members active and get more membership is going to be requested, made if a proper job is to be done, President Conroy stated.

# Problem On Snow Removal Gets Airing

The City Council gave its approval Monday night to the John's Landscaping Service to solicit snow removal business in the city this year but not without considerable discussion.

It was indicated by City Manager John Dinan that the G. & C. Snow Removal firm that had rendered this service to homeowners and business places in past years was not planning to operate here again this year as it had been satisfied with the job done.

There was no objection to the John's firm itself. The discussion actually came on a point which was raised by Councilman Hugo Peterson. He objected to any snow removal firm running their tractors and sweepers over the sidewalks of the city, approved by Detroit Edison, could be used for decorations and banners for other occasions during the year.

Other councilmen and City Manager John Dinan agreed that Peterson was justified but were in accord that it would not be practical or possible to require a removal firm to skip spots up and down a street to doing their removal.

Peterson remained unconvinced on this point but voted in favor of approving the John's Landscaping firm's request.

(Continued from Page 1) acts are not dumped anywhere in the city's business sections twice weekly. In regard to the special arrangements that Plaza officials had made with McCreedy for one day collection each week and for the cutting of weeds, councilmen agreed that this was a private matter to be handled by McCreedy and the Plaza officials and the city should not get involved.

ED BALDEN, manager of the Downtown Farmington Center, who was present at Monday night's meeting stated that all areas in the Downtown Center are not getting twice weekly pickup either. The dumping of the trash receptacles at the fronts of stores is handled by the center itself, however, he commented.

Councilmen agreed that if all areas in the city's business sections were not getting twice weekly service as contracted for, steps should be taken to correct the situation. They did not, however, feel that any action beyond this point should be taken.

The city manager was instructed to study the complaints in more detail and report back as soon as possible on corrective measures taken.

# City Police Chief Named MACP Comm. Co-Chairman

Announcement was made this week of the appointment of Maurice D. Foltz, Director of the Farmington City Department of Public Safety, as co-chairman of the Disastor and Civil Defense Committee for the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police (MACP). The appointment was made by Superintendent of Police William Johnson of Grand Rapids, President of the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police.

In making the appointment, Supt. Johnson said, "Never before in the history of organized society have the forces of law and order been so challenged. And never has the need for greater and more concerted police action been so pronounced."

"Highway and traffic accidents," Supt. Johnson continued, "are taking an unprecedented toll. Juvenile problems become more extended, and the crime rate continues to climb."

"The PRIMARY purpose of our Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police," Supt. Johnson said, "is to meet these problems head-on by encouraging greater state-wide police cooperation and efficiency."

"To this end," he concluded, "and because committee work is of such extreme importance I have named you (Chief Foltz) co-chairman."

Chief Foltz will serve in the capacity through 1968.

# 3 from CHS Get \$100 Litter Fines

Three Farmington youths were fined \$100 each by Livonia Municipal Judge Robert Johnson on Wednesday, September 29, when they pleaded guilty to a littering charge.

All three boys are seniors at Clarendonville High School and were eating their lunch in a car parked near the school during the noon hour when a Livonia policeman observed one of the boys drop a paper bag out the car window. The policeman issued littering tickets to all three boys, Chris Hawkins, 17, of 20749 Hugo Street, George Dennis of 29223 Dresden and Randy Smith of 21331 Colingham, all in Farmington.

CHRIS HAWKINS is the captain of the Clarendonville High School football team. He and his companions had no trouble with the law prior to the littering violation.

In handing down the \$100 littering fines, Judge Lorian said "The area where this offense occurred is well posted with signs stating that a \$100 fine for littering. All of them pleaded guilty as charged and there was no reason why they shouldn't be expected to pay the \$100 fines."

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# 13 Mile M' Belt Crash Injures Franklin Man

A two-car accident at the intersection of 13 Mile and Middlefield roads in Farmington Township Sunday afternoon, October 3, resulted in serious injury for a Franklin, Michigan driver, and a passenger in the other car received minor injuries.

The driver of the other car, Frank S. Blazny, 41, of 5318 Donerly in Orchard Lake, was northbound on Middlefield. He escaped injury but his son, Michael, 12, a passenger with him, received minor injuries.

(Continued from Page 1) struction at a total valuation of \$393,000. The largest month coming in September when the total valuation on all new construction was \$3,191,814.

OTHER TOTALS for the City of Farmington for the third quarter include 2 permits issued for new commercial construction, totaling \$25,500 in valuation. The first half had one commercial permit issued at \$32,000 in valuation bringing the nine-month total for commercial construction permits to 3 at \$57,500 valuation.

Through the third quarter, Farmington City has issued a total of 65 building permits for home additions valued at \$102,160; 32 permits for garage construction valued at \$36,350; 10 permits for commercial additions valued at \$33,950; 3 industrial building permits valued at \$67,000; and 3 permits for industrial building additions valued at \$107,600.

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# Cab Stands Still Problem

It was reported at the regular City Council meeting Monday night, Oct. 4, that neither the Farmington Cab Co. nor the Checker Cab Co. are now maintaining cab stands in the city.

This fact was revealed when Councilman Ralph Yoder questioned about the Farmington Cab Co. had found a location for a cab stand within the 90 day period they were allowed to do so at the time the Council authorized them to operate in the city.

Councilman John Allen suggested that if the cab companies did not find suitable stand locations soon it might be well for the city to consider putting up one or more temporary shelter buildings in the new downtown parking lot locations.

The city manager was instructed to investigate on this suggestion and report back.
