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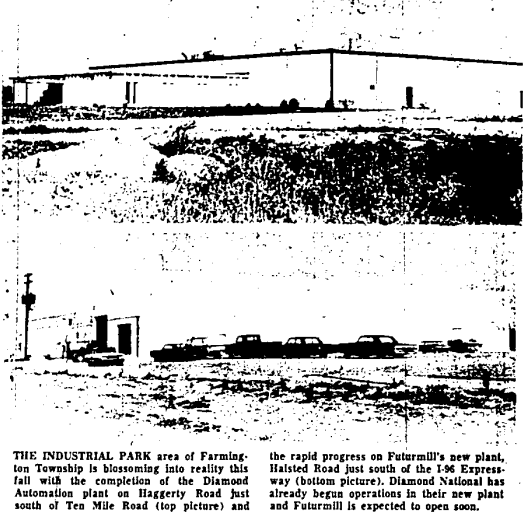

Monthly Master Points (MMP) are awarded according to the American Contract Bridge schedule and number of tables in play. MMP games are played once a month.
