

Schools Plan To Observe American Education Week

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Farmington Public Schools will join thousands of school systems throughout the land in observance of American Education Week, Nov. 8-12. Although all Board of Education meetings are open to the public, the regular meeting of November 8 has been designated as an Open House. The public is urged to drop in at the Administration Building, 2500 Shiawassee. Meetings begin at 8 p.m.

Elementary school principals have announced the following events in their respective schools:

Alameda welcomes parents to classroom visits throughout the week. Although Beechview's Open House was Oct. 18, principal Kenneth Lachmann will have parents and members of the community for classroom visits "at all times" because of incomplete construction of the Open House. It has been postponed until January, according to principal Veldton Petz.

Cloverdale will observe Open House all week during school hours. More than 200 people turned out for their Oct. 25 Open House. At Eagle, the special Education wing will be open with demonstrations in progress during the Nov. 9 Open House set for 7:30 a.m. All special education personnel will be on hand. That day at 7 a.m. children will demonstrate their physical achievements. Of special interest will be the whirlpool bath, mat work, posture training and a tour of the occupational therapy facilities.

FLANDERS SCHOOL will be open to the public all week with individual programs planned in various rooms. The school hall will play at High Meadows' Open House Nov. 9 from 7 to 9 p.m. The classrooms will be open for parents to visit and a special display of children's literature will be shown in the library. Kenbrook School has planned special times for parents to visit the classrooms. Parents have been informed of the schedule by letter. Classroom demonstrations include such things as Israeli dances by the 6th grades, reading and mathematics demonstrations, and panel discussions in other study areas.

The new Lakeside School, though lacking some finishing touches, will welcome parents and the community at a "Getting Acquainted" night Nov. 10 from 7 to 9 p.m. Principal James Janigan will introduce his staff and the children's work will be on display. Longacre's Open House, Nov. 10 at 8 p.m. will permit tours of the classrooms and will feature displays of students' work. Parents are welcome, as usual, at Middlebelt School throughout the week.
