Mr. Hall gave us a talk on the location and duties of the Township and answered several questions regarding Township meetings, budget, and elections. 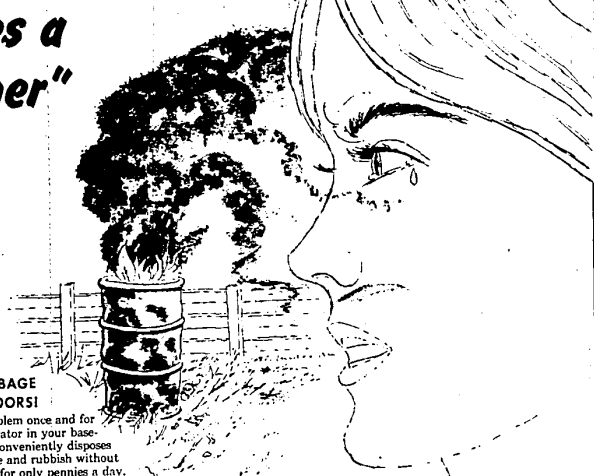

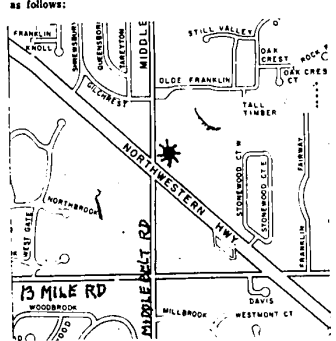
