### Advisory Committee Sought In Twp. Incorporation Vote

Farmington Democratic Chairman Aldo Vagnozzi has suggested that an extraordinary effort be made to form Township residents of all the facts surrounding the pending incorporation vote.

Vagnozzi suggested that this extraordinary effort can best be achieved through a citizens advisory committee patterned after the group which recently served the Farmington School District.

VAGNOZZI SAID the study committee being considered by the Township Board is a good beginning but that it needs to be expanded to include more citizens. He said this could be done by asking each organization and subdivision association active in the Township to name a representative.

Interested individuals should also be invited to participate in addition to the organization representatives, according to Vagnozzi. He said that Township officials setting up the committee should not dominate it and should insure that viewpoints other than their own are represented in the group.

Vagnozzi said a committee representative of the entire community is needed to fully answer concern which many citizens have expressed over taxes, the name of the proposed city and the possibility of forming one municipality which combines both the present City of Farmington and Farmington Township.

"A number of subcommittees could be formed from the over-all citizens advisory committee to cover major areas involved in the incorporation proposal such as finances, safety, roads, water and sewers, zoning and others," Vagnozzi declared.

"I WOULD HOPE this committee would cover both the advantages and disadvantages of incorporation and also alter-

natives to becoming a city." Vagnozzi also proposed the following additional steps to help inform the voters:

- 1.) Holding of a number of hearings in various sections of the township to give citizens an opportunity to give their views and suggestions on the incorporation question;
- 2.) Setting up an information service at township offices where citizens can get answers to questions they have about incorporation;
- 3.) Designating persons in every area and subdivision in the township to serve as information spokesmen for their neighborhoods;
- 4.) Setting up of a speakers' bureau and scheduling of speakers to appear before meetings of area organizations; and
- 5.) Using of all communications media available in the area to inform voters so they will have all the facts when it comes time to voting on this issue.

Interested individuals should also be invited to participate in addition to the organization representatives, according to Vagnozzi. He said that Township officials setting up the committee should not dominate it and should insure that viewpoints other than their own are represented in the group.

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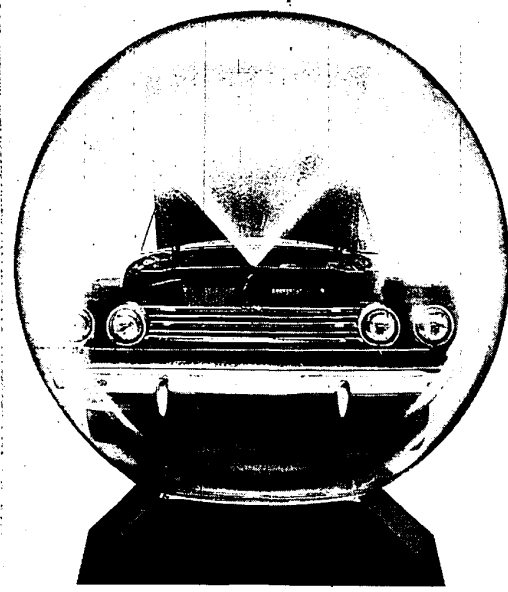

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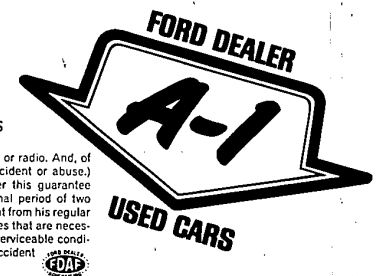
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
