An opportunity will be provided for questions and answers from the audience.

"All parents, teachers and students in the junior high program are invited to attend," said Al Lorenger, program chairman.

Mayor Speaks To Students at Gov't Workshop

The mayor of the City of Farmington, Sandy Brotherton, spoke on municipal government and the qualities of leadership at the recent Farmington Senior High Student Council Workshop.

The annual workshop was held Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 27 and 28, at the American Youth Hostel in Milford. The clinic provides an opportunity for student council representatives to discuss leadership and the problems of student government and to learn new ideas for the execution of the council's objectives.

Mayor Brotherton's talk covered the two related areas of government and leadership. Through the use of charts and maps, he explained to the council members the organization of Farmington's government and some of the difficulties involved in maintaining it. The mayor then went on to stress several essential qualities of a good leader. Among them were: 1) a spirit of cooperation; 2) the ability to persuade; 3) enthusiasm (the leader must "carry ideas forward"); 4) self-respect; 5) emotional maturity; and 6) a leader must have self-discipline. Mayor Brotherton said that a leader must "fit himself to assume responsibility."

Students To Register For Nat'l. Tests

Clarenceville High School students who expect to graduate in time to enter college in 1967 can now register for the 1966-67 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test at the high school office. The first qualifying test will be held on Tuesday, March 1, 1966; and students participating will be requested to pay a \$1 fee to the testing agency, Science Research Associates.

This test program will help a student in future educational planning as well as allow for competitive scholarship awards. Highest scoring individuals in each state will compete for national awards. Last year awards numbered some 2,000 and ranged from \$400 to \$6,000 depending upon the recipient's need for financial assistance.

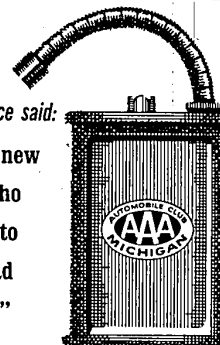
