## Not A Problem for the Schools to Solve

We think it's about time the School District was relieved of having to solve traffic safety problems.

Recently, as in the past, several safety problems have been taken to the Board of Education for solution. The board has been faced with a choice of ignoring the requests or spending school funds to provide crossing guards or bus transportation.

Such auxiliary services, according to a new law, if available to public school children, must also be made available to non-public school children attending non-public schools in the district.

The Farmington area will continue to grow and traffic problems are bound to grow right along with the increase in population and traffic. Meanwhile there are now 16 elementary schools and five secondary schools in the district, as well as four non-public schools. Three more schools are planned to be built within the next five years.

School officials have forestalled many problems by locating schools in the centers of mile areas, thus eliminating the crossing of main roads for many children. However, it is, and will be, necessary for some children to cross busy roads; but it should not be the responsibility of school officials to make every

crossing safe for children.

The school district needs every penny of its revenue for the operation and maintenance of the schools. Crossing guards, lights, signs and extra bus runs cost money—and school operating money should not have to be spent on community safety problems.

The school district is responsible for the safety of our children while they are on school property or riding in school buses. Beyond that, the problems of safe crossings for school children should be the responsibility of parents and Township, City and County officials.

In the Township provision has been made for developers of new subdivisions to build sidewalks along main roads. Plans are being made to require deceleration lanes, turning lanes and passing lanes at various subdivision road intersections. All this has been designed to keep traffic flowing. But little is being done to provide any orderly breaks in traffic so that pedestrians can safely cross the main roads.

In our opinion, traffic safety problems should be taken directly to the Township Board or to the City Council and these governmental bodies should set up the necessary organization and funds to solve them.

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## Put the Responsibility Where It Belongs

Complaints have been running rampant these days about movies that shouldn't be allowed to be shown in the local theatres. Plays that shouldn't be staged and books that shouldn't be allowed to be placed on the public or school building library shelves.

Frequent and most flare-ups and attempts at controlling the kinds of books and magazines that should be allowed on display at the corner drug store and elsewhere have been cropping up practically every year ever since we were kids.

The question really boils down to whether there should or should not be stringent controls on what is permitted to be printed or shown in pictures for general public consumption and if so where the controlling jurisdiction should rest.

We've been wrestling with this one for a long time and just can't seem to answer to ourselves always seems to come out in favor of the same way. When a man or woman becomes of age (18 or older) they have every right in the world to view, read and do just about any damn thing they please as long as it is within the law. Determining what is morally or socially right or wrong is a personal thing and should remain so.

When it comes to those under 18 years of age still living at home, the controls should rest squarely in the hands of their parents. Each and everyone of us as parents has the personal responsibility of seeing that our children grow right from wrong. It is our job to set the rules and regulations on the kind of books our children can read and the kind of movies they will be allowed to go to or television programs they will be permitted to watch.

The books, movies or TV programs which may be considered wrong for youth by some adults may be considered perfectly alright for young boys and girls by others. Governmental legislation, censorship boards or other types of regulatory bodies will never change this and shouldn't.

Each mother and father must set their own standards and regulations for their own children and then put forth all the efforts and energies required to control that they are abided by. The control has got to rest in the hands of the parents.

Those parents who want censorship of movies or TV programs or book bans lack control or they wouldn't be so concerned.

To The Editor,

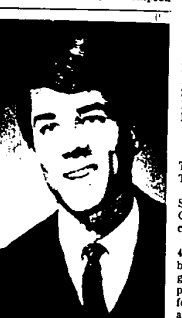

## Township of Farmington Board Proceedings

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was called to order on November 22nd, A.D. 1965, at 8:15 p.m. by Mr. Curt Hill, Chairman. Members present were Oppenheimer, Cairns, Bassette, and Bogue. Also present was Mr. Joseph T. Brennan, Township Attorney.

Minutes for Regular Meeting, November 8th, 1965, stand approved as published.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Duke, that Ordinance No. 30-D, An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 30-A entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the establishment, operation and maintenance of water supply system 'A' to provide water supply system 'A' to the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, for the acquisition of certain water transmission mains and related facilities as a part of said system; to provide for the issuance and sale of revenue bonds to defray a part of the cost of such acquisition; to provide for the retirement and security of said bonds; to provide for other matters relative to said system and bonds; and to repeal Ordinance No. 30 of the Township Ordinances" be approved. Carried, 6 Yeas, 0 Nays.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Bassette, that the Township Board has declared its intention to proceed with preliminary engineering for water facilities in Peleebrook Estates Subdivision, and hereby directs Pate, Hill & Bogue, Inc., registered professional engineers, to prepare plans for lateral lines to service said subdivision, and an estimate of the cost thereof, and when prepared to present the same to this Board. Roll Call Vote: 6 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried-unanimous.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan:

Section One. That the zoning map of said Ordinance No. 29 of the Township of Farmington, as amended, be and the same is hereby amended to show B-4 district classification where RA-4 district classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

Part of the SW¼ of Section 25, T1N, R9E, beginning at a point, N 255 ft. from SW Sec. cor.; thence N 539.0 ft. to the center of the road; thence S 89 degrees 08'54" E 575.86 ft.; thence S 0 degrees 02'12" E 337.09 ft.; thence N 89 degrees 08'54" E 575.86 ft. to beginning, 4.73 acres, F430.

Section Two. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section Three. All ordinances or parts of ordinances are hereby ordered to take effect upon publication of the Ordinance in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

Section Four. This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, at a meeting thereof duly called and held on the 22nd day of November 1965, in order to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
