Quakertown Questers Learn About American Folk Art

Quakertown Questers were enlightened on "American Folk Art" when Mrs. R. W. Shaftey spoke at the Questers' November 17 meeting which was held at the home of Mrs. R. Zimmerman, 2835 W. Nine Mile Road, Farmington.

Along with her talk on this subject, Mrs. Shaftey gave an interesting commentary on numerous slides depicting "American Folk Art".

Mrs. Shaftey explained that we have folk art in our coverlets, quilts, pottery, figureheads, wooden Indians and in many other objects, ornamental and useful. As a contrast she compared fine art, created by the great masters largely for the rich and ruling classes and

the church, with "American Folk Art". In "AMERICAN FOLK ART" Mrs. Shaftey said, we discover the character and interests of a people, and the forces that molded their lives. She stressed it is not an unskilled imitation of fine art. It was produced by amateurs who worked for their own gratification and the applause of their families and neighbors, and by artisans and craftsmen of varying degrees of skill and artistic ability who worked for pay.

Between 1825 and 1850, folk art in every medium, flourished in America. New England was the richest center of folk art because it was richest in craftsmen, woodworkers,

metal workers and painters. Folk painters flourished also in New Jersey, the Hudson River Valley and throughout the German sections of Pennsylvania.

At Beautification Meet

A report of how garden club members in 11 Midwestern states, including Michigan, are spearheading dramatic local improvements was brought home today by Mrs. Keith B. Willoughby, a member of the Farmington Garden Club.

Mrs. Willoughby, who is second vice-president in the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan, was among six delegates from this state attending the Third Annual Midwestern Conference on Garden Clubs at the Center for Continuing Education, The University of Chicago.

During the two-day meeting, the 70 delegates exchanged information and ideas about the hundreds of community beautification and improvement projects conducted by their local and state garden club organizations.

One of the conference's highlights was a report by Mrs. Donald B. Smith, President of the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan, on the progress of community beautification and improvement a competition held through the Civic Improvement Contest. This activity is co-

sponsored by the state garden club and Sears, Roebuck and Co. retail stores.

Among the prize winning projects is that of the Farmington Garden Club. The triangular piece of city owned land lying between Oakland Ave. and Grand River is being landscaped and groomed to be a beauty spot. One of the aims of such a project is to interest the community and its citizens in actively participating in such worthwhile objectives.
