Falcon Cagers Beat N. Farmington, 68-55 For First Court Win

Farmington High School downed North Farmington, 68 to 55, last Saturday night on the first quarter. It was Farmington's first game win of the 1965-66 season and the second straight setback for the Raiders.

RAIDER COACH Dick Wilson will take his cagers on the road this Friday night, December 10, for a Northwest Suburban League encounter at Franklin, North Farmington bowed to Kettering in their

The Falcons were down, 15-14, at the end of the first period and found themselves behind, 27-23, at the intermission as the Raiders had the range led by Rick Lorenz who scored 18 points for the night and Rich Schultz who netted 12 before leaving the game on fouls early in the fourth quarter.

It was a different story in the second half as Farmington outscored the Raiders 19 to 12 in the third quarter and 28 to 10 in the final eight minutes.

JUNIOR GUARD Greg Dorow led the Falcon scoring attack in the final minutes and ended up the evening with a 25-point contribution which was topped only by his All-Confer-

ence teammate Mike Wilson who poured in 26 points running from the other guard position. The rest of the Farmington points were fairly evenly distributed between the forwards, Mike Ames (7), Sieve Moore (5), George Harbit (4) and Mike Thompson (1).

RICH SCHULTZ, the 6-4 Raider forward, notched eight of his 12 points at the charity line where he only missed two for a deadly 80 per cent accuracy on free throws. Even department but given fewer opportunities was Lorenz who sank all four of his charity tosses.

Following behind the Raider scoring pacemakers, Lorenz and Schultz, were Kurt Schumacher with nine points, Jim Rulaugh with eight points, Bill Bowles with five points, Bill Oldershaw with two points and John Carby with one point.

Officials from Farmington Township were on hand to help welcome a new industry, State Fabricators, Inc. into the community last Friday, December 3.

The new Farmington Township industrial plant, located on Eight Mile Road just west of Middlebelt Road (30550 West Eight Mile), is engaged in the manufacturing of automatic handling equipment for the automotive industry.

THE PRESIDENT and majority stock holder of the former Southfield plant, Charles E. Fields, explained that Farmington Township offered an ideal site for his operations which needed room for expansion. The plant occupies a five-acre site formerly owned by the Wallace Construction Company.

A new building was added along with the expansion of an already existing building to provide over 17,000 square feet for operating work. It features a new expansion program at State Fabricators which will allow them to add a new steel cutting service '30

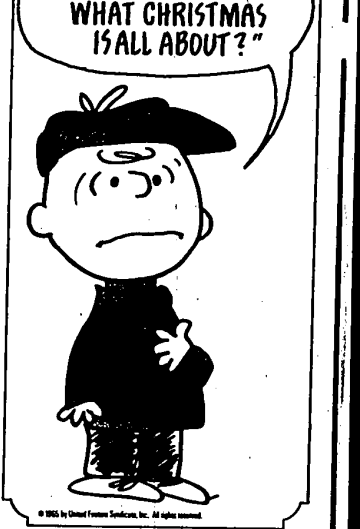
