ATTENTION SENIOR CITIZENS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON

The Senior Citizens Tax Exemption Act of 1965 provides a general property tax exemption of up to \$2,500 of State equalized valuation, subject to the following requirements:

- 1. 65 years of age or over and a resident of the State for at least seven consecutive years.
- 2. Ownership of real property that does not exceed \$10,000 of State equalized valuation.
- 3. Combined gross income that does not exceed \$5,000 an-

Applications will be taken from January 1, 1966, until Feb. 28, 1966. se Senior Citizens who qualify, will receive the tax exemption for the 1966 tax year.
