Assists All Den Mothers Although many mothers are hesitant about becoming den mothers, Pack 48 through Mrs. Florence Sharp, Den Mother Coordinator, has been very helpful in assisting their den mothers to plan and run a successful den. The mothers attend a meeting once a month and, at these meetings, they are given valuable help in planning their own den meetings. Ten Mile PTA Offers French, Spanish Lessons Elementary school youngsters wishing to take advantage of French and Spanish lessons to be offered at Ten Mile School must have their registrations returned by January 8. PTA President Donald McGregor has announced.

McGregor said the Saturday morning classes would be open to all elementary public school students in the city and also to those who attend Our Lady of Sorrows school.

The classes will begin January 22 and run for 10 weeks. A fee of \$8 per child will be used entirely to pay the teachers.

Second to sixth grade pupils are eligible for the program.

The proposed schedule provides French for second through fourth graders and Spanish for fifth and sixth graders from 9 to 9:45 a.m. and Spanish for second through fourth grade and French for fifth and sixth grade from 10 to 10:45 a.m.
