Health Insurance Available

Under Social Security Laws

The 1965 amendments to the social security laws provide for hospital and medical protection starting this July for millions of people age 65 or older. William E. LaRock, District Manager of the Pontiac Social Security office, announced this week. This includes many people in Farmington who are still working and also people who have had little or no work under the social security program.

Insurance to help pay part of the cost of hospital bills will be automatically available to any resident of Farmington age 65 or older. They have already filed for monthly medical security benefits. People who are still working, and those with little or no work under social security, can get this important protection, LaRock pointed out, by filing an application.

"EVERYONE" this program does not fully affect until July 1966. I want to urge everyone age 65 or older to contact our office as soon as possible to make the necessary application," LaRock stated. "We have already taken thousands of these applications, but there are still many people in this area who have not applied."

"There is no premium to be paid for the hospital insurance by the individual covered, since the cost will be paid out of a special trust fund set up under the law. A person can have expenses paid for 60 days of hospitalization for any one illness.


