

Falcon Cage Drive Stalls As Skippers Win, 68-57

Farmington's basketball engine, tuned for the long drive toward the Inter-Lakes Conference championship, roared to life Friday night, then sputtered, then died.

A near capacity crowd in Waterford's antiquated gym saw the Falcons drop their first conference match to the Skippers of Waterford 68-57.

Greg Dorow, a six foot junior forward, led Farmington's scoring attack with 15 points. Following Dorow came Mike Wilson, with 13; Steve Moore, 12; and center Mike Ames, with 11. Wilson, though he scored only one basket, was 100 per cent from the free throw line as he hit 11 straight tosses.

Rick Ziemi of Waterford captured high scoring honors, however, with 20 points. Bruce Bookout was close behind the all-conference star with 17, while Skippers Dave Ferris and Mike Smith notched 10 apiece.

But the game, despite an 11 point margin at the finish, was close for three quarters. At the end of the first quarter, the score was tied, 14-14. Early in the second quarter, Farmington, aided by several Skipper blunders, leaped into a 24-16 lead. Waterford, not to be denied victory, slipped in the next six straight points, and had the Falcons tied 35-35 when the first half ended.

The third quarter was simply a repeat of the previous two, and Waterford carrying a slim three point lead into the last eight minutes of play.

With 2:30 remaining, the narrow lead still stood, Waterford

ahead 38-35. Then Farmington literally lit apart. Blagues for poor shooting and costly mistakes, the Falcons could only make one basket for the rest of the game, and Waterford added ten more points to see it off 68-57.

George Grimala bombed in 19 points as the little Falcons rolled over Waterford's junior varsity 62-45 prior to Farmington's varsity defeat.

Ahead 25-17 at halftime, the little Falcons widened their lead to 17 points in the third quarter and then coasted. In the scoring column, Tom Wirtz followed Grimala with 11 points, Charlie Conn, 10, and Al Kikka with 8.

Farmington, overall, now has four wins and four losses for the 1965-66 season. Next week, the Falcons play host to Walled Lake as they seek to find their way back to the winning road. The hapless Walled Lake Vikings have lost their last six games, and were trounced 80-50 by Pontiac Northern last week.

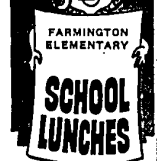

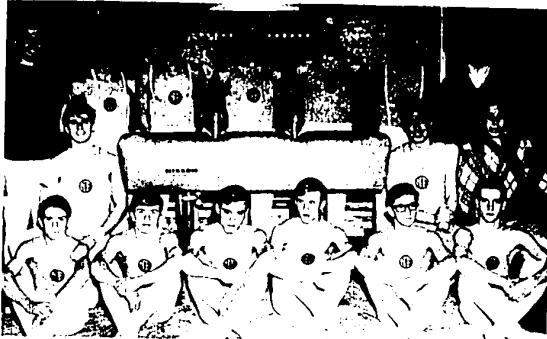

Sorrows Wrestling Team Has Real Rough Schedule

The Our Lady of Sorrows wrestling team opened a series of home dual meets last week which will run through February 8. Lancer coach Dan W. Potter has what looks like a University of Michigan football schedule with just two of the remaining nine meets to be staged in the OLS gym.

Junior Cliff LaFond provided one of the bright spots in Lancer wrestling action prior to the holiday break from classes. He won the Oakland County Championship in the 154-pound weight division even though he

sustained an injury which kept him out of the dual meet with Clarenceville which OLS lost for their second straight dual meet loss of the season. The first loss for OLS came at the hands of East Detroit which opened the season.

Lost through graduation from this year's team were captain Rick Korte (138 lbs.), Mike Gidlaw (145 lbs.) and Jerry Wroblewski (132 lbs.). Also lost to the Lancers through transfers to other schools were Mike Solar (120 lbs.), Greg Popp (127 lbs.) and Kevin Riordan (138 lbs.).

RETURNING lettermen for the Lancer matmen are Tony Tucker (junior at 103 lbs.), John Clark, a two-year veteran, (junior at 120 lbs.), Brian Maes (junior at 112 lbs.), Tim LaFond (sophomore at 138 lbs.), Cliff LaFond, a two-year veteran, (junior at 154 lbs.), Terry Caillouette, a two-year veteran, (senior at 165 lbs.), Frank

Walsh (sophomore at 180 lbs.) and Steve Queen, two-year veteran, (senior at heavyweight). Outstanding newcomers to coach Potter's squad include: Emil Grohman (junior at 154 lbs.), Mark Hartwig (sophomore at 145 lbs.), Ron Shuster (soph. at 120 lbs.), Tom Bitterle (soph. at 127 lbs.), Tom Douglas (soph. at 133 lbs.) and Jim Totkay (junior at 180 lbs.). All six of the new varsity wrestlers earned letters with the Lancer Reserves last year.

COACH POTTER'S evaluation of the 1965-66 Lancer wrestling team at the outset of the season still holds true in most respects. Before the season started, coach Potter's outlook was as follows:

"The squad is still young and is probably still a year away. Only three seniors are in this year's squad of 25 men, and we have an outstanding group of new freshmen and sophomores out for the first time. Last year's squad with primarily freshmen and sophomores lost its first five dual matches before winning its next six and then losing its last match of the season. If we can get started earlier this year, this could be an outstanding season."

"Two of our lettermen have transferred to other schools, (Mike Korte - 120 lbs. - to North Farmington; and Greg Popp - 127 lbs. - to Clarenceville) and this has created several gaps which will have to be filled by new men."

"A real battle should be fought for several starting assignments, especially in the 95 lbs. weight class. John Abowd and Brian McDonald, both freshmen have looked good and will vie for the starting assignments here."

Understanding your HEALTH

Most of us know enough to keep various substances we know as poisons away from the reach of small children. But how many of us, for example, would think to store a bottle of vitamins away from eager little hands?

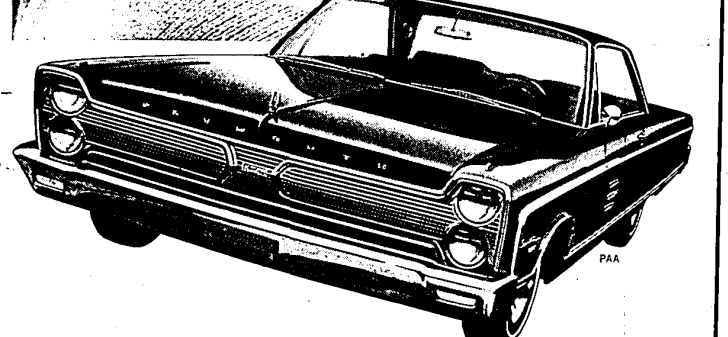
The vitamins, along with other things that are beneficial in proper quantities, such as medicines, drugs and tonics, will kill if the child swallows a massive quantity of the substance. Protecting your child against accidental poisoning involves more than just putting the bottle and the insecticide on the top shelf, although this is important, too.

Over 60 percent of the children treated for poisonings in Michigan hospitals last year had consumed medicines—yes, helpful things. Just plain aspirin accounted for more than half of the tragedies, followed by poisonings from diet-control pills, headache and stomach upset remedies, sleeping pills, hormone preparations, tranquilizers, laxatives and vitamins.

COMMON household chemicals caused the other 40 percent. Ordinary laundry bleach was the biggest offender in the chemical group. In all, almost 3,000 Michigan children under five years old became poison victims last year—and 16 died. Now, you can go a long way toward preventing accidental poisoning in your own home by keeping in mind just six simple practices:

1. Store all obviously poisonous substances away and out of reach of children.
2. Store all medicines, vitamins, drugs and other substances that kill when taken in excess, out of sight and out of reach, and away from food.
3. Call all medicine what it is—medicine, and never refer to it as "candy" or as any kind of "food."
4. Keep all substances in their original containers.
5. Teach your children not to eat any food or drink any beverages except at the table, or when mom or dad says it's okay.
6. Teach your child the difference between food and medicine, and teach him that medicine is off-limits at all times, except when given by mom, or dad.

But in spite of these precautions, should a poisoning accident occur, call your family doctor immediately. Speed is essential in poison treatment, so keep key phone numbers handy.
