ELECTRIC PROJECTS. Include the continuing construction of two generating facilities. The largest, a 385,000-kilowatt addition to the James H. Campbell steam-electric plant at Port Sheldon, west of Grand Rapids, is scheduled for completion in March, 1967. A 70,000-kilowatt power peaking plant in use in emergencies and at times of highest power demand on the system, is being completed in June, 1966.

Forest Hills Church Slates United Missionary Soc. Rev

The Rev. R. S. Reilly, foreign secretary of the United Missionary Society, will open a Farmington engagement next Sunday, January 18. He has visited more than 115 countries on all the major continents. Last January he completed a four and one-half month mission tour which included Nigeria, Egypt, Lebanon, India, Japan and the Soviet Union. During the week he spent in Farmington, Mr. Reilly visited churches in Moscow and Leningrad and discussed with pastors the state of the church in Russia. Returning to Western Europe via Berlin, he was greeted by slingshot-wielding East German border guards while attempting to take their picture at the Berlin Wall. Their aim proved less sure than the Biblical David's, as he reports that they missed their target and he was uninjured.

SIX WEEKS HERE spent in Nigeria where the United Missionary Society has a staff of approximately 70 missionaries. An extensive education program includes teacher training college, ten elementary schools, an English theological college and three vocational Bible schools. In addition, the mission conducts a Bible correspondence school which has enrolled more than 48,000 students and graduated over 25,000 from Bible courses in three languages. Major high voltage transmission system projects include construction of large substations south of Flint and just east of Grand Rapids, to strengthen the bulk power supply to these areas.
