Masonic Lodge Seeks Donations For Temple
Farmington Masonic Lodge officials announced this week that work on the remodeling of the old, historic town hall building as permanent Masonic Temple quarters is now near completion.
The contractor has promised to have all remodeling work by Monday, January 24, they stated.
Strong community sentiment to retain this landmark at the corner of Grand River Avenue and Farmington Road prompted Masonic Lodge officials to purchase the city and township's interest in the building and undertake a major remodeling project on the historic structure.
A mortgage of \$70,000 was obtained to undertake the remodeling work.
The Temple Association has created a special "Centennial Honor Guard." Businessmen, professional men, club members or residents of the community who might wish to donate to help pay off the remodeling debt will be automatically made members of the special "Centennial Honor Guard," it was stated.
A plaque made from an over 100 year old walnut beam will be put up in a place of honor in the remodeled Temple and contain the name of every "Centennial Honor Guard" member.

Know Your Michigan Law

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms the provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)
Injuries suffered by any child under 17, which have or may have been inflicted by a person responsible for the child's care, must now be reported by the examining physician to both prosecuting attorney and state department of social welfare.
Such reporting is now possible for the first time under Michigan's new "battered child" law (Act 98, PA 1964).
Law enforcement and welfare personnel have long shared with the medical profession the knowledge that many so-called accidental injuries to infants are deliberately inflicted by parents or guardians. Until passage of the battered child law, however, officials were helpless to act, because of legal prohibitions forbidding doctors to disclose any information made known during physician-patient contact.
The new law, by releasing the "doctor from secrecy," makes it possible to establish the nature and cause of adult-inflicted injuries to children, to prosecute the adults responsible, and - most important - to remove the child from the custody of the adults who inflicted the injuries.
